Toledo, Ohio, May 16 .- Protest against the Willard Dempsey heavyweight championship fight scheduled to be decided at Bayview Park, a municipal owned plot of ground here, on July 4th, is expected to be in the hands of Governor Cox of Ohio and A TAX ON Sheriff Mathias today. These officials, together with Mayor Schreiber, of Toledo, were requested by the Toledo Ministerial Union, an organization of 250 churches, to prohibit the contest. The protest, mailed to the state officials and to Mayor Schreiber, advertised the coming battle as a "gladiatorial contest worthy of the Roman arena of infamous memory," declared that it would teach youths "to see red," and would result in an invasion of gamblers and thieves to Toledo. ## MARSHAL FOCH PAYS VISIT OF INSPECTION TO THE RIVER RHINE THE NEW YORK

Given a Salute on Arrival Within the Shadow of the Statue of Emperor William II—Was Escorted by a Fleet of French Gunboats.

Coblenz, May 15-Marshal Foch, who is inspecting the Bridgeheads held by the Allied forces along the Rhine, arrived here at 11 o'cock this morning, accompanied by General Mangin, commander of the French forces in the Mayence District. The party came from Mayence on the river steamer Bismark.

As the Marshal landed withing the shadow of the statue of Emperor William 11 of Germany at the confluence of the Moselle and the Rhine, a salute of nineteen guns was fired by twelve french gun boats which had escorted the Marshal and his party from General Mangin's headquarters.

Gen. Hunter Liggett, greeted Marshal Foch at the landing later being escorted to the headquarters of third army. At head-NEAR HALIFAX quarters Marshal Foch received the staff officers and the members of the British and French Missions there, afterwards taking luncheon with General Liggett.

This afternoon the Allied commander-in-chief made his first visit to the fortress of Ehrenbreitstein, the famous fortress across the Rhine from Coblenz, which was stormed and captured by the French in 1794.
