## THE COUNTY OF KENT HAS A SHOCKING MURDER CASE

Robert Childs, Alias McIntosh, Shot Four People, One Fatally—Great Excitement in the Neighborhood—Murderer Set Fire to a Barn and Then Took to the Woods—Posse Now Searching for Him.

Moncton, May 15—According to information reaching Moncton tonight there is great excitement in Kent County over a case of arson and shooting near Rexton this morning. Robert Childs, alias Robert McIntosh, recently of Moncton and formerly of Vancouver B. C., is alleged to have shot his nephew's wife, her son and a neighbor and set fire to a barn, burning six head of cattle and a horse. He then fled to the woods. The casualty list follows:

Mrs. John Childs, about forty-five years of age, shot through the lung, died tonight.

Harold Childs, her son, aged sixteen shot through the groin.

Louis Hebert, a neighbor, about fifty years of age, shot twice through the breast may die.

### Search for Fugitive

Louis Hebert is suffering much pain. The bullet passed across his breast and came out under one of the arm. He is suffering intensely and considerable fear is felt. The boy Harold Childs, is also suffering but his wounds are not so serious as in the case of his mother and his neighbor. A body of men started for the woods under Sheriff Boudreau, but no trace had been obtained of Robert Childs up to 9 p. m. He had about six or seven hours' start before the posse was organized. It is said that he is armed with revolvers.

Robert Childs came to Moncton from Buctouche on Wednesday, returning last night. Early this morning he went out to the old family homestead on the St. Nicholas river, a beautiful spot about one and a half miles from Rexton. His nephew John Childs lives at the homestead. It is said that Robert contended that he had a claim on the property and had a grudge against his brother's family. Whether this is true or not is yet unknown. Childs, it is believed intended to intercept his nephew who is employed in a mill at Rexton. The latter is in the habit of going to work at 6 o'clock but last night there was some accident to the machinery and he went an hour earlier than usual this morning to make repairs.

### Did Not See Nephew

Judging from the hour at which Robert Childs went out to the Childs' homestead it was the intention of Robert to meet his nephew. But they did not meet, possibly owing to the fact that the nephew went to work earlier than usual. According to a story received here this afternoon when Robert Childs reached the house he insisted that a farm employee, Robert Harding should set fire to the building. When the hired man refused to do this, Robert Childs went into the house and made the same demand of Mrs. Childs. They unfortunately did not take him seriously and Harold Childs and Robert Harding went to the barn with some grain. When they left the barn they discovered that the barn had been set on fire. They rushed to the barn but in the meantime Robert Childs had reached the house, entered it and it is alleged shot Mrs. John Childs and set fire to the house. Two neighbors Louis Hebert and his son noticing the fire rushed over to give assistance. Six head of cattle and one horse was burned, but another horse was taken out by Louis Hebert but Childs shot the horse after it was taken out.

Hebert in the meantime went back trying to save more cattle. Robert Childs pulled the door against Hebert and shut him in the barn. Hebert, however forced his way out and was shot twice.

### Childs Had Money

Robert Childs resided in Moncton since last fall having stayed at the boarding house of N. P. Poirier on Main Street. He is about eighty years of age and did not work, having considerable money. He always had a revolver with him but did not seem to act very strangely. He was at his boarding house Monday last leaving and saying he was going to Rexton. From Rexton he said he was going West. While in Moncton Childs went under the name of Robert McIntosh. His description is given as a man smoothly shaved, walks erect, has grey hair and would weigh about 180 pounds. The property on which the shooting took place is the Childs' homestead, now occupied by John Childs and his family. Robert the

uncle, has claimed that he is entitled to the property or a portion of it, but acquaintances however, say that this belief was but imagination only, and that he has always been considered of unsound mind. Three years ago it is alleged he made threats to burn out the family of his nephew, John and also to shoot them. He visited the place three summers ago and stayed around for some time. During the day he would go away in a boat and return at night to the vicinity of the property.

Word was received here by Chief Rideout from Magistrate Ferguson of Rexton informing him of the shooting and asking his advice and assistance. The chief referred the magistrate to the attorney-general of New Brunswick.

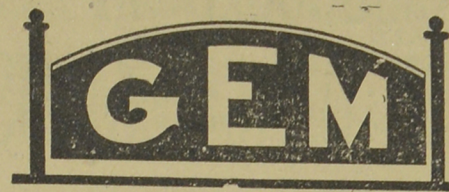
