GAUDY BEADS BECOME FAD. Geggaws More Colorful Than Precious and Unlimited as to Size.

Those first Americans, the Indians, never loved beads and geggaws more than this present generation; that is, if we are to judge by the vogue for strings of beads of every sort to hang about our necks.

Sautoirs of strings and strings of very small beads put together until the strips placed side by side are perhaps an inch wide, are very new and very lovely too.

Very Old-Fashioned.

So old-fashioned are these ornaments both as to the necklace and the gaudy glinting pendants that they are being given as prizes at bridge parties for people are beginning to have bridge parties again.

Nothing so surely proves a thing all the rage as its appearance as a bridge prize. Witness the boudoir cap, then the camisole, then the gay quill pen, and so on down to war stamps, with which we soothed our consciences if we played "endurin de war."

The pendants are marvellous to see. And curious too, for many of them are copies of quaint old Egyptian things that one sees on mummies in museums. For instance, a little ornament about four inches square is made of imitation jade, carved in the most intricate fashion until the jade celluloid is as delicate as silver wires.

They Are Not Precious.

By a curious notion, none of these gay things are real or precious in any way—they are gay and striking, vivid and brilliant and really flaunting, but there seems to be little desire for anything real or precious.

Moire ribbon and heavy chenille tassels play quite a part in this queer fad. Links of jet, long slender beads, rather, are linked together with narrow moire ribbon and finished with very long chenille tassels. This sort of necklace is made up in all the gay colors, as well as in jet, and the chenille tassels match in color, green, red, bright lapis lazuli blue and so on.

Locketts are Huge.

The huge locketts of amber, tortoise-shell and ivory are also very smart. They, too, are mounted on the moire ribbons, though now and then one finds them affixed to chains made of the same material as the locket. One side of these little cases is fitted with a mirror and the other is intended to hold a picture. Is it not strange that all down the ages women have found a way of preserving the image of some loved one in some pleasing way such as this fad of the memory locket?

Early in the 19th century they delighted to wear memory pins which were cunningly wrought to show weeping willow trees made of hair, trailing over a little painted monument of grief while one or more small painted figures sat near.

SIX PERSONS DROWNED

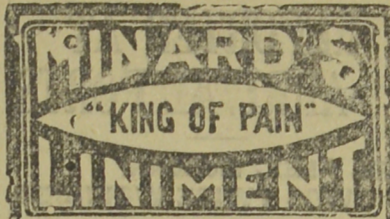

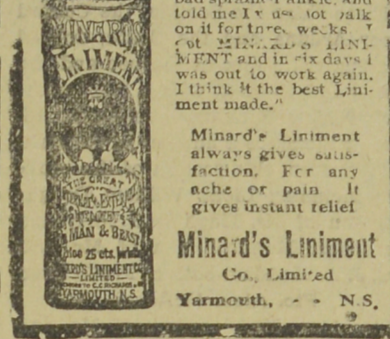
Bracelets are Gone.

- Beans—8 to 10 hours. Beef—Sirloin, rare, per lb., 8 to 10 minutes; well done, per lb., 12 to 15 minutes; rolled rib or rump, per lb., 12 to 15 minutes; long or short fillet, 20 to 30 minutes. Bread—Medium loaf, 40 to 60 min. Cake—Plain, 20 to 40 minutes. Biscuit—10 to 20 minutes. Sponge Cake—45 to 60 minutes. Chickens—3 to 4 lbs weight, 1 to 2 and a half hours. Cookies—10 to 15 minutes. Custards—15 to 20 minutes. Duck (game)—40 to 60 minutes. Fish—6 to 8 lbs., 1 hour. Gingerbread—20 to 30 minutes. Graham Gems—30 minutes. Lamb—Well done, per lb., 15 min. Mutton—Rare, per lb., 10 minutes, well done, per lb., 15 minutes. Pie crust—30 to 40 minutes. Pork—Well done, per lb., 30 min. Potatoes—30 to 45 minutes. Pudding—Bread, rice and tapioca, 1 hour; plum, 2 to 3 hours. Rolls—10 to 15 minutes. Turkey—70 lbs., 3 hours. Veal—Well done, per lb., 20 minutes.
