HON. W. L. MacKENZIE KING WILL RUN IN P. E. I.

Liberal Chieftain Tendered a Unanimous Nomination at a Great Convention Held at Summerside—Liberals in Fine Fighting Fettle and are Determined to Roll Up Big Majority for Mr. King Should There be a Contest.

Summerside, P. E. I., Sept. 4.—The Liberals of Prince county are feeling greatly elated, today, over the fact that they are to have as their candidate for the seat vacated by the death of Captain Joseph Read such an influential and outstanding figure as the new Liberal leader, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King. The convention which gave him the unanimous nomination here today was not only one of the largest which the county has known but one of the most enthusiastic. Every prominent Leader of the county, including the premier and local M. P. P.'s were in attendance and all were in great fighting fettle determined to roll up a record majority for Mr. King if a contest is brought on.

The Conservative press has endeavored to stir up dissention in the Liberal ranks by asserting that the offering of the nomination to Mr. King would be resented by the three local men who were previously in the running for the nomination but at the convention today these men, Messrs McLean, Saunders and Gallant warmly supported the nomination and in enthusiastic speeches rang the changes on the great honor and benefit which would come to the county if the coming premier of Canada was the representative.

There was only one name before the convention and that was Mackenzie King and the mention of the name was followed by applause and cheers. The feeling at the convention is but a reflection of the feeling among the people and that is that Prince county has everything to gain by what transpired today. It is significant that Mr. King was offered the candidature by two of the local aspirants who were delegates to the Ottawa convention and the third who was then on the island at once fell into line when the suggestion was made.

A Liberal County

The late Captain Jos. Read had a majority of 324 in Prince in 1917, including the soldiers' vote, or 767 with civilian vote only, so that Mr. King's opponent, who may be ex-Premier Arsenault, will have no easy undertaking especially in view of the Liberal provincial sweep last July when eight out of ten Liberals were returned for the county.

It is understood that locally there is no strong desire for a contest, but Ottawa may insist upon it in view of the effect which election by acclamation here might have on other constituencies in Canada. Every parish was fully represented at today's convention. Dr. J. J. McNeill, who moved the nomination today was the spokesman of the delegation from Prince county, who invited Mr. King to run just after he was elected leader at the Ottawa convention.

Summerside is preparing to give Mr. King the greatest reception ever tendered a public man when he arrives here to begin the campaign. J. H. Bell who accepted the nomination for Mr. King today, leaves tomorrow for Charlottetown to take over the government which Premier Arsenault gave up today.

Had Choice of Four

Ottawa, Sept. 4.—With opportunities to seek election to parliament from vacant constituencies in four provinces Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King today decided to accept the unanimous nomination tendered him by the full Liberal convention in Prince Edward Island now vacant through the death of the late Captain Read.

As soon as he was elected Liberal leader he was approached to accept the nomination for Glengarry and a day later a deputation from Prince waited on him with the same plea. Then he was informed that if he desired the nomination of Quebec East, which Sir Wilfrid Laurier represented until his death he could have it. Various prominent westerners also can-

vassed him to know if he would consider running for Assinabonia if he received the nomination. To all of them he said that he would consider each in the order by which he had been approached, and that he would only be able to consider in any case an unanimous nomination.

Learning that the farmers of Glengarry had a man in the field, he wrote to the Glengarry Liberals that he would not care to be nominated under circumstances which might make it appear that he was in an attitude of opposition to the farmers.

Today he received a telegram from Prince tendering the unanimous nomination and he wired his acceptance.

The election takes place on October 27, and Hon. Mr. King will consult the wishes of the Liberals of Prince as to when he goes east for the campaign.

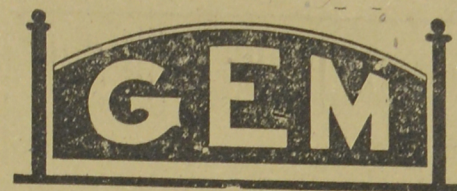
