

STUMPAGE BASIS SALE ON 17TH INSTANT

SOME THREE HUNDRED
SQUARE MILES OFFERED

Licenses to Run Until August,
1921 — Upset Price to be
Announced at Time
of Sale.

The Royal Gazette contains notice of a sale at the Crown Land Office, September 17th of the right to cut and carry away all classes of merchantable lumber on the lands described in sixty two berths in various parts of the province.

About three hundred square miles of Crown Lands are offered in the berths. Licenses are to run for two seasons ending August 1921. The sale as was a previous sale will entirely be on a stumpage basis, no mileage or fire tax being imposed. The upset price will be announced at the time of the sale. Spruce, fir, pine and cedar will be the standard with hemlock four-fifths, hardwood one half and poplar three quarters.

One a Cooperative Organization
at Rogersville—Two New

RESISTANCE CASE DISMISSED BY MAGISTRATE

DECIDES THAT VEHICLE IS
NOT A PLACE UNDER ACT

Interesting Case Arising Out of
Attempted Seizure of Liquor
in Carriage—An Appeal
Likely.

This morning Police Magistrate Limerick dismissed the charge placed against a returned soldier of resisting arrest by Liquor Sub-Inspector Herbert Saunders and ordered the \$100 bail to be raised.

The charge was of resisting the officer in the course of his duties and has drawn considerable interest from the public. The prosecution based their case on section 162 of the Intoxicating Liquor Act, 1916, which states that a private vehicle which contains liquor for sale or a person having it in his possession for sale can be searched. The Magistrate gave his decision on section 153 of the Act in which the word "place" in its ordinary dictionary meaning in conjunction with the wording of the section can not be applied to a vehicle such as was searched but can be applied to a residence, field, lane, etc. He then stated that according to the wording of the section the officer had no right to search the vehicle in question, which was a carriage and that further the prisoner was not resisting an officer in the course of his duties. He therefore dismissed the case and ordered the \$100 bail to be raised. G. T. Feeney appeared for the defence and P. J. Hughes for the prosecution.

Appeal Expected

An appeal from this decision is expected. Chief Inspector Wilson is out of Fredericton at present. In the past there have been a number of instances of vehicles being stopped and searched by sub-inspectors.
