



#### A Privilege.

But I must not dwell on what is pas but on that which is to come. It is for the young men (aye, and women too,)such as yourselves today, to develop those possibilities and to solve those probems; in a word, to guide the destiny of our land and, under God, to deter-mine the character of its social and political, its moral and religious life. This is a great task. It is so full of difficulties and so beset with dangers through the present world-wide tur-moil and unrest, that it may well daunt the stoutest heart.

No Time for Pessimism. But this is no time for pessimism nor is there any room or reason for it here.
