## HON. MR. FOSTER ATTENDED CONFERENCE AT OTTAWA

Says Delegates from New Brunswick to Attend National Liberal Convention will be Chosen Early in the Summer—The C. N. R. Authorities Urged to Use Minto Coal—Subsidy for Valley Railway Extension.

St. John, May 22—Premier Foster returned yesterday after attending a conference of Liberal leaders in Ottawa. He said yesterday that the selection of delegates from New Brunswick to attend the national Liberal convention in August will be made in the early summer.

The important matter, the premier said, was to lead up to the appointment of an organization committee, to prepare for the national convention in August. The first step in New Brunswick will be to select twelve delegates from among the Liberal members of the legislative assembly and the defeated Liberal candidates at the last local election. Following, conventions will be called in the respective counties which will follow the lines of the dominion ridings. Each county having one representative in the dominion house will have the privilege of selecting three delegates and three substitutes. In the case of the St. John Albert six delegates and six substitutes will be chosen. Arrangements for the calling of these meetings will be made later. They will be called after consultation with the county organizations, by the premier, who is acting for the organization committee of the national convention.

This representation from each province will make quite an army when it meets.

### Harmonious

The premier remarked that the proceedings at the conference on Saturday and Monday were marked by the utmost harmony and quiet enthusiasm.

While in Ottawa the premier in company with Dr. J. E. Hetherington and G. H. King, representatives from Queens county in the local house endeavored to enlist the sympathy of the C. N. R. officials toward the use of coal from the Minto district on the lines of the C. N. R. in the province. The objection was put forward that the mines were not on the line of the gov-

ernment railway and that the policy of the railway was to encourage industries upon its own lines. To offset this objection an interview was obtained with the authorities and the argument put forward that a connection of the Transcontinental with the Minto coal fields would not only be an advantage to the mine owners but would aid in developing coal mines in New Brunswick and at the same time would provide additional traffic for the railway by opening up a market for this coal at such places as Quebec and Three Rivers and other industrial points on the line of the C. N. R. west of the province.

### The Valley Railway

While the premier was in Ottawa the minister of railways introduced into the house a resolution extending the time within which the St. John & Quebec Railway Company is authorized to complete construction and equipment of the line from Centreville to Andover. The extension was made to Dec. 31, 1921. This referred not only to the extension of time when it might be completed but also had reference to the subsidy agreement.

This, Premier Foster explained meant that should conditions seem favorable at any time for the extension of the line from Centreville to Andover the authority of the dominion government and the subsidy agreement will already have been continued.

Another matter in which the premier interested himself while at the federal capital was in connection with proposed dominion aid to the provinces in the matter of road building. "Notwithstanding reports to the contrary appearing in the press" the premier said, "I still have hope that the proposed aid may yet be forthcoming."

## LENINE WANTS TO OVERCOME THE WORLD

Vienna, May 22.—Telling the correspondent of the Associated Press that he was quoting the exact words of Nikolai Lenine, the Bolshevik Premier in Russia, Dr. adislas Rudas, a Hungarian professor, who has just returned from a six month's visit to Moscow, says Lenine declared that he would not make peace, but continue class warfare until the whole world was one in brotherhood.

"President Wilson," Lenine is quoted as saying, "does not represent his time nor its ideas. He is merely a smoother-over trying with a pint of oil to still the whole ocean of troubled waters. He does not see capitalism ended. Neither President Wilson nor the Allies can make an enduring peace or solve political and economic problems because a world revolution is at hand. The destruction of capitalism may cost many lives, but this will be as nothing compared with the great war."

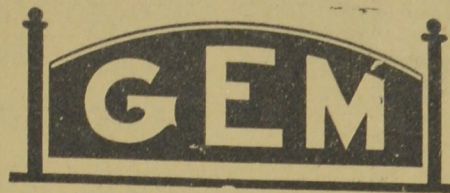
## NATIONAL SUFFRAGE FOR WOMEN

Washington, May 21—National Suffrage for women was endorsed by the House of Representatives for the second time today when the Susan B. Anthony amendment was adopted by a vote of 304 to 89. Supporters of the measure immediately arranged to carry their fight to the Senate, where although twice defeated in the last session, they are confident of obtaining the necessary two-thirds vote.

## EMPLOYES WILL STRIKE

Montreal May 22—In protest against the delay of the Company in negotiating with them, and for other reasons the employees of the Canadian Vickers Company, Limited, will walk out of their shops at four o'clock this afternoon, and proceed to a meeting, which is to be held in the Maisonneuve Market Hall. Since the demonstration at the Vickers plant last week, when 1,400 men struck work, negotiations between the men and the Company have been dropped with the understanding that they would be resumed as soon as the shipping plans of the government were known.

The men have become impatient under delay and are taking this means to protest.
