# DIVISION ON THE BUDGET SCHEDULED FOR TOMORROW

Party Whips Have Persuaded Members to Limit Their Speeches to Twenty Minutes—Mr. Pardee, Former Chief Liberal Whip, Declares for the Amendment—The Government Sure of a Safe Majority When Division is Taken.

Ottawa, June 17.—The majority of the western speakers on the budget coupled with their declaration of allegiance a threat that the government would be expected to come through with reductions next year. There has been a rumor also that the big strike was being wielded in the shape of another threat to resign by Borden which would precipitate an election, something neither party could contemplate under existing conditions. But this is unlikely as there has never been a sufficiently powerful scheme to cause alarm for the safety of the government. But by some means a number of the recalcitrant ones have been brought back to the fold, and the number of government supporters who will desert it on the budget is now estimated at not over a baker's dozen, while it is said that Lapointe, Euler and MacRae will vote for the budget. The government would have no cause to worry over such a showing.

### A Time Limit

Ottawa, June 17.—A successful effort was made by the party whips tonight to induce members to limit their speeches on the budget to twenty minutes in order to reach a division Thursday night. The list of members desirous of being heard was still a long one and it was realized that unless the talk was curtailed on the division on the McMaster amendment could not be taken when planned. As a result of the cutting down of speeches a score of members were heard before the house adjourned.

### Pardee for Amendment

Speeches listened by the house today included one by F. Pardee, a former chief Liberal whip, who may be the only member elected as a Unionist east of the great lakes to vote for the McMaster amendment. Mr. Pardee declared himself in favor of free foodstuffs and clothing and urged that the duties on agricultural implements be reduced to the lowest possible point. In tariff legislation he said the farmer must be considered if the people generally are to benefit.

Supporters of the budget proposals at the morning and afternoon sittings of the house were Mr. McIsaac, of Queens; Dr. Myers, of Kindersley (Sask.); J. R. Wilson, Saskatoon, and E. W. Nesbitt, North Oxford, while J. F. Fafard and Dr. Deslialier, two Quebec members favored the McMaster amendment.

At the evening sitting critics of the budget included H. T. Fortier, J. F. Campbell, Nelson (Man.); Thomas MacNutt, Salt Cotes; Levi Thompson Qu'Appelle and W. H. White, Victoria-Alberta, all of whom indicated that they would support the McMaster amendment.

Members who stated that they would vote for the government's proposals included T. E. Simpson, West Algoma; Dr. Tolmie, Victoria (B. C.); I. E. Argus, Swift Current; H. H.

### H. C. L. the Enemy Now

Mr. Pardee said that in 1914 the enemy at the gate was the Hun. In 1919 the high cost of living was the enemy at the gate. Preparations had been made to meet the enemy in 1914, but what was being done in 1919? The way to make food cheaper Mr. Pardee argued was to have more production. To have more production, tools with which men produced must be cheaper. The tariff on farming implements and implements of production should be reduced to the lowest possible rates. Foodstuffs, including clothing should be admitted free. Further, there should be a downward revision of the tariff.

"When the government did make up its mind to reduce the tariff," Mr. Pardee declared, "the least they should have done was to see that the whole per cent war tax was knocked off and not fish made of one and fowl of another."

Manufacturers must recognize as common sense that there was a rising tide of opinion in the country that they had protection far beyond the interests of the business they carried on. Would not manufacturers recognize that fact, Mr. Pardee continued, rather than to continue in their stiff-necked position of giving nothing and taking all.

### Profiteers Fattened

Profiteers had been allowed to fatten on their ill-gotten gains and had not paid an adequate share of their profits into the treasury.

He expressed concern at the bank mergers taking place in Canada of recent years. The tendency he said, was for the large financial institutions to absorb the smaller ones, thus gradually eliminating competition.

The income tax proposals, said the speaker were a step in the right direction but the big man should be forced to pay more. He thought that the tax had not been properly collected.

Mr. Pardee expressed strong disapproval of the government's action in issuing war bonds free of tax. He suggested that from today every bond should be subject to income tax on the basis of the last return. He also expressed the hope that the next bond issue would be made subject to taxation.

As a means of raising revenue, he thought that a graduated tax on corporations would be effective. "Tax what you like," he said, "but for Heaven's sake leave the food and raiment of the poor people alone."

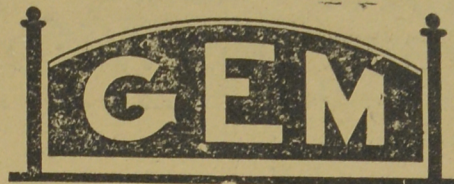
