**M. E. DOOHAN BUYS PART
OF T. LYNCH ESTATE**

**Situated to the East of Regent
Street—Land in Line With
the Aberdeen Street
Extension.**

Mr. Michael E. Doohan has closed the purchase of valuable property from the T. Lynch Estate. The property includes a dwelling and some four acres of land on the easterly side of Regent street and north of the property formerly known as Scully's Grove.

The property is assessed at a valuation of \$4,500 but the purchase price is said to be less than that.

The property lies in the line of extension of Aberdeen street between Regent and St. John streets and is considered valuable for building purposes.

PHARMACEUTICAL SOCIETY OF N. B. IS IN SESSION

**OPENED IN THIS CITY
THIS MORNING**

**Local Druggists to Entertain
Visitors at Seven Mile House

The thirty-fifth annual meeting of the N. B. Pharmaceutical Society opened this morning at eleven o'clock, the sessions being held at the K. of P. Hall. Between twenty and thirty delegates from this city and outside points are in attendance.

This morning's session consisted chiefly of the reading of the reports of the President and the Secretary. Only the preliminary and routine business was carried out to make ready for the business session this afternoon. The meeting adjourned shortly after twelve o'clock and reopened session at 1.30 o'clock this afternoon.

Visiting Delegates

Among the delegates from outside Fredericton are Col. J. D. B. McKenzie, of Chatham; J. McB. Cook of Moncton, H. H. Woodworth of Sackville, President F. W. Munro of St. John and Secretary George O. Spencer of Moncton. Mr. C. A. Burchill of this city is vice president.

This Afternoon's Proceedings

This afternoon the election of officers for the ensuing year will be held and discussions in connection with the Pharmacy Act, the Maritime College of Pharmacy, the Prohibition Act, and other questions of interest to the society will take place. The meeting will probably adjourn at four o'clock and the visitors will be entertained by the local druggists at the Seven Mile House at a supper. The meeting will probably be completed this evening as the majority of the delegates will be leaving for home then.

Judgment in Civil Action

Nova Scotia Registration

For some years prior to 1908 there was no general registration of births in Nova Scotia, and therefore the births of many Nova Scotians are not officially recorded. In recent years it has been found of advantage to be able to produce a birth certificate on some occasions, and Nova Scotia is now registering births of any persons born before 1908. Those desiring such a record are sending the facts to the Deputy Registrar General, at Halifax.

BEAVERBROOK TO ARRIVE HERE THIS AFTERNOON

**MOTORING OVER FROM
NEWCASTLE WITH FRIEND**

**Many Remember Him as Max
Aiken When He Spent Some
Time Here—Now Re-
cuperating.**

Lord Beaverbrook, better known to the people of New Brunswick as Max Aiken, is expected to reach Fredericton late this afternoon. Lord Beaverbrook is coming from Newcastle by motor. Dr. W. D. Ross of Montreal is accompanying him. They will register at the Queen Hotel.

Lord Beaverbrook who recently passed through a very severe sickness in England, is visiting his native province to recuperate. In earlier life he had many personal friends in this city and spent considerable time here. His brother Mr. Mons Aiken, at one time was teller of the Fredericton Branch of the Royal Bank of Canada.

Sole Failure in Reorganization

It is recalled with interest by those who knew Lord Beaverbrook when he was in this city that one instance in his career as a reorganizer of large enterprises, took place here, and is noted as the sole instance of failure among the many similar efforts in which he has been engaged. This instance was the attempt to reorganize the business of the late Alexander Gibson. Halifax capitalists including the late John F. Stairs, M. P., were approached but the attempt fell through. Later the Alexander Gibson Railway & Manufacturing Company was organized and took over the properties, others bringing out the reorganization.

Prominent in Great Britain

Lord Beaverbrook since taking up his residence in Great Britain has had a remarkable career. He had knighthood conferred upon him and later received a peerage. During the war his activities never ceased. He is given credit for bringing Bonar Law and David Lloyd George together, with the resulting formation of the Coalition Government. He also was Minister of Information.

Sentence of One Month Given

An old offender who was fined \$5 yesterday for being drunk and released upon his paying, was arrested again between four and five o'clock in the afternoon. He was found lying on Smythe street with three empty bottles of Jamaica Ginger and two full bottles of the same in his possession. He came before Police Magistrate Limerick this morning and was sentenced to thirty days in the County jail.
