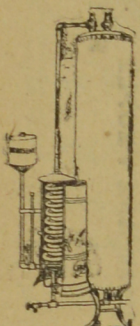

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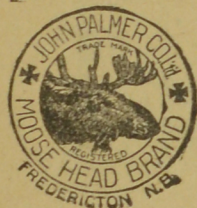

## PROGRESSIVE SHEEP RAISING LEGISLATION

Mr. Norman Stansfield, Acting Chief Sheep and Goat Division, Ottawa, with Mr. J. K. King, Maritime Representative of the Livestock Branch have been in Fredericton conferring with the Honorable J. F. Tweeddale relative to the co-operation of the two departments for the further advancement of the sheep industry. Mr. Stansfield is very favorably impressed with the possibilities for sheep protection and likewise with the progressive legislation that has been enacted for the protection and purchase of sheep by the department. While in Fredericton Mr. Stansfield visited the wool ware-

house and expressed himself as being well pleased with the quantity and quality of the wool accumulated.

Some very important decisions affecting both the farmer and the breeder were arrived at. The Federal Department of Agriculture is offering a bonus of \$5.00 a year for two years in succession to a farmer who will use a pure bred ram. This bonus applies to farmers who have never used one before. The Honorable J. F. Tweeddale has given his assent to a provincial bonus of \$5.00 for the same purpose making a bonus of \$15.00. It is anticipated that this bonus will be an incentive to the farmer for the purchase of more and better rams as it will make up the difference between the purchase price of a pure-bred and a scrub. The motive is simply to demonstrate for two years the value of the pure bred sire verses the scrub, and if at the end of two years the farmer is convinced by concrete evidence, that is better lambs, then it is assumed that he will continue to use pure-bred rams, but will receive no further bonus.

Another decision affecting the owners of grade flocks was arrived at, viz. that if a group of twenty-five farmers in any district or parish will get together and appoint a representative to purchase stock, the Department of Agriculture will pay his travelling expenses to any place east of Fort William, Ontario and will, if possible have a representative go along and help make the selection. This idea should appeal to farmers' organizations throughout the country. The representative will have to purchase twenty-five rams in order to have his

## A BLUENOSE PREACHER MAKING GOOD IN BOSTON

Boston, July 28.—From earliest time the fame of the preachers of Boston has been nation-wide, and the recollection of such men as Philips Brooks of Trinity, George C. Lorimer of Tremont Temple and many others are delightful memories for the present generations. It may be truthfully said that the fame of Boston's preachers has shed a lustre to that city, the Athens to America.

The people of the Maritime Provinces are, above all the people of America, a church-going people, and consequently when they visit Boston they naturally inquire where a fine preacher, with excellent music, can be heard. One of the most popular and best known preachers of Boston today is Rev. Austin K. DeBlois, pastor of the Commonwealth Ave., and Clarendon St. Baptist Church (off Copley Square) who was born at Wolfville Nova Scotia, and during his eight years of ministry here has endeared himself to the people, particularly Canadian born of this city. Consequently on Sunday morning one is sure to meet other Canadians at this church when visiting Boston. In fact, the Maritime Provinces has already furnished its quota of ministers for Boston and nearby cities' churches are most of whom have been graduates of Acadia College.

Dr. DeBlois was born at Wolfville,

N. S., the son of Dr. Stephen W. DeBlois, for 30 years pastor of the Wolfville Baptist Church. The son graduated from Acadia College in the class of 1896 and then went to Brown University for a post graduate course, taking his Master's degree in 1888, and Ph. D. in 1889, being spoken of at that time as the "youngest Doctor of Philosophy in the World," and later "the youngest College President."

Dr. DeBlois later studied in Berlin and Leipzig, returning to America to take the vice-principalship of the Union Baptist Seminary at St. Martin's, N. B., later made principal and after serving for two years in that office was called to the Presidency of Shurtleff College, Alton, Ill., the oldest College west of Ohio.

Five years later he assumed the pastorate of the First Church of Elgin, just out of Chicago, a church of 1300 members. Later was pastor at the great First Church of Chicago, succeeding Dr. P. S. Henson, who had succeeded Dr. George C. Lorimer both far famed pulpit orators.

About eight years ago Dr. DeBlois was called to the First Baptist church Boston, where has since been preaching to large congregations. First Baptist Church is one of the landmark edifices of Boston, designed by Richardson, the famous architect, and one of the oldest religious organizations on the Western Continent, founded

## HOW PRICES ARE CONTROLLED BY PACKERS

Washington, July 29.—Ability of the "big five" packers—Swift, Armour, Norris, Cudahy and Wilson—to determine from day to day the general level of livestock prices was declared incontrovertible in the third section of the federal trade commissions report on the industry made public last night.

Information obtained in the commission's investigation, was cited to show that the "big five" have an interest in 48 of the 50 principal market yards of the country and a majority of voting stock in 22 others. It was said they buy most of the livestock at these markets.

"They discriminate against and put at great disadvantage independent buyers—their competitors," the report said. "They manipulate on occasions the livestock market in such a way as to cause extreme and unwarranted fluctuations in the daily prices paid

for livestock. They have eliminated many competitors and prevented new ones from coming in. They have restricted the meat supply of the nation by manipulating the daily livestock prices and thus discouraging the producers of livestock.

"Of the meat trade in the hands of inter-state slaughterers in the United States, the five big packing companies have more than 72 per cent of the total. They have the prices of dressed meat and packing house products so well in hand that, within certain limitations, meat prices are made to respond to their wishes."

Notwithstanding special advantages said to be enjoyed by the five big packers, the commission declares it was not demonstrable that they are more efficient than the "independent."

In tracing the ownership of the various stock yards, the commission in its report, devoted much attention to the "remarkable financial devices" known as the bearer warrant, which it was said might be used not only to hide completely true ownership, but also was equally effective in making possible the evasion of income, corporation and surtaxes if it came into more general use. Such a warrant is a receipt for a stock certificate the latter being made out to the treasurer of the corporation who delivers the warrant to the person who actually owns the stock. In this way it would be possible for a stockholder to receive dividends and vote without his identity being known. J. Ogden Armour was said by the Commission to own 19.4 per cent of the Chicago Stock Yards Company, but the use of bearer warrants was asserted to have prevented the commission from discovering who owned the other stock.

Much of the commission's report dealt with matters already made public in the hearings conducted by Francis J. Heney as special investigator for the commission.

## GOOD CHOICE FOR CHAIRMAN

Toronto, July 31.—A despatch from Ottawa to the Globe says: Hon. H. G. Bland, four years a prisoner of war in Germany, has been appointed head of the Liberal committee to frame a policy for the recognition and reinstatement of returned soldiers, the care and education of the wounded, and the aid of the widows and orphans of the fallen.

A scheme for the grading of pure-bred rams bred by the breeders of New Brunswick was also decided upon. New Brunswick is the first country in the world to adopt this method which is probably the most advanced measure yet taken by any Department of Agriculture for the protection of the farmer who buys his stud sheep by mail. Briefly the scheme is as follows: Rams will be classed as Superior, average and common and will be marked 3 star, 2 star and 1 star respectively. The rams will be branded by an expert sheep man and if a farmer writes to a breeder for a 3 star ram then he will be assured that he will get a first class article. Each ram will be marked. Further, the Federal Government will bonus only 3 star and 2 star rams and will not bonus the common or 1 star ram. Consequently, farmers desirous of taking advantage of the \$15.00 bonus offered by the Provincial and Dominion Department of Agriculture should bear this in mind. The Provincial Department of Agriculture is granting a bonus of \$3.00 and \$2.00 respectively on each 3 star and 2 star ram produced by the breeders of the Province. 1 star or the common rams will not be bonus in any way, and it is hoped that these 1 star rams will be finally eliminated from the trade.

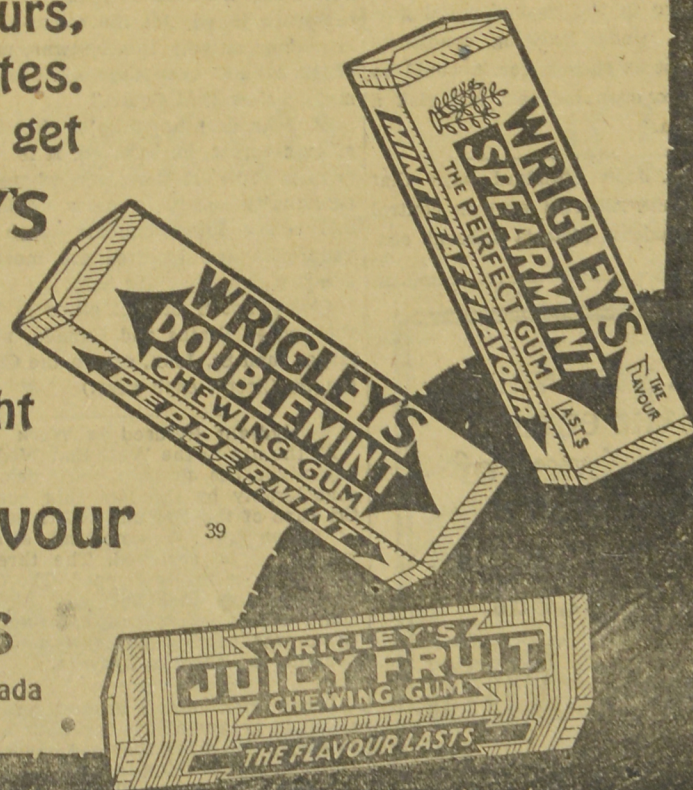
