

DR. M. V. COFFYN MEDICAL INSP. OF CITY SCHOOLS

INSPECTION WILL BEGIN
WITH THE NEXT TERM

Salary \$400 per year — Milk
Must be Up to Standard—
Cancellation of Licenses
Threatened.

A meeting of the Fredericton Board of Health was held last evening at the City Hall with a good attendance of members. It was the opinion of the members that steps should be taken to improve the class of milk being sold, by revoking licenses of all milk vendors whose milk standard is low. It was also urged that milk vendors who had not taken out their licenses, including old vendors as well as new ones, should be made to do so or lose their licenses altogether.

Medical Inspection for Schools
Dr. M. V. Coffyn was appointed medical inspector for the city schools at a salary of \$400 a year. Dr. Coffyn has had a wide experience overseas having but recently arrived home. He served with the Royal Army Medical Corps and was with the late General Maude's army in Mesopotamia where he saw extensive service. Later he served in England. Prior to joining the Imperial Army Dr. Coffyn practised his profession at Bathurst and Meductic.

Inspection Will Start Next Term
The inspection of pupils in the schools of the city in accordance with the Public Health Act will begin with the term which will open this month.

Returned to Bathurst
Hon. P. J. Veniot (Minister of Public Works) after spending a few days here on departmental business left last night for Bathurst. It is expected that he will go to Ottawa next week.

Fire Broke Out Again

The death occurred at an early hour this morning at Mauderville of Annie May Shankel, the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Shankel. The deceased was but five months of age. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock.

Dr. O. E. Morehouse ex-M. P. P. who is an enthusiast on the subject of good roads, recently made an auto trip which is pretty hard to beat. He made the run from the centre of the highway bridge to his home at Smith's Corner, a distance of seventeen miles in exactly thirty minutes.

Gordon W. Grey of this city and Maude Ethel Pond of North Devon were united in marriage on June 30th at St. Paul's Presbyterian Manse by Rev. J. S. Sutherland. The groom is a returned soldier and is very well known here. He was severely shell shocked overseas.

The city street lights went off last evening about 11.30 o'clock as a result of a break-down at the City Light plant, Carleton Street. They were off in all about fifteen minutes and caused some inconvenience to pedestrians on their way home from the A. O. H. Festival at Devon and other places.

Given Heavy Penalty
Samuel Hudlin of Ripples appeared before Magistrate Halifax at Minto yesterday on the charge of killing deer illegally and selling the meat also illegally. He was convicted and a penalty of fifty dollars fine with thirty dollars costs was imposed. The prosecution was conducted by Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon.

INQUIRED AT BANGOR RE AN ARREST HERE

SCREAMED "I DID NOT
KILL HIM, I TELL YOU!"

Priscilla Cowan, Intoxicated in
Streets Last Night—Officer
Coming from Bangor to
Examine Her.

A woman was arrested last evening about midnight by the Fredericton police and was locked in a cell overnight drunkenness being the charge laid against her. Pending her being brought before Police Magistrate Limerick inquiries are being made by the police over the long distance wire at Bangor, Me.

Created Excitement
When arrested last evening the woman who was drunk at the time caused some excitement by stating in a loud voice "I did not murder him I tell you." She has been in this city for some time and while here she has been staying at a house in the central part of the city. Investigations are being made following her statements which she made in an intoxicated condition as it is thought that she knows something about the murder of James Sproul of Orono, Maine, on Wednesday, July 23rd. Residents of King Street who were awakened by the noise of the woman thought at first that this city had been the scene of some fearful tragedy last evening. Whether the woman knew what she was saying at the time or not can only be judged as a word relative to her position concerning the Orono murder has been heard yet from Bangor.

Officer Coming From Bangor
The Chief of Police of Bangor was communicated with at noon and he in turn communicated with Sheriff Hernandez who is sending a man on from Bangor this afternoon to investigate. The prisoner gave her name as Mrs. Priscilla Cowan.

Force Reduced
The strength of the Canadian military police corps in Military District No. 7 was reduced Thursday to 10 men and the A. P. M., Captain Goodday. This number is required to carry on the work of the military police in this district.

That Big Trout
Dr. O. E. Morehouse ex-M. P. of Upper Kewick who is a keen sportsman and angler is willing to challenge the statement published in The Mail this week that an eight pound trout caught by a forest ranger in the Miramichi is a record breaker for the province. Twenty years ago the doctor caught a trout in Fish Lake on the Keswick which measured 26 inches and girthed 14½ inches. The trout caught last week was 24 inches long and had a girth measurement of 16 inches. As neither fish was weighed the doctor thinks it a fair proposition that his is at least as large as the other.

The inspection of the recently built portion of the St. John & Quebec Railway between Gagetown and Westfield took place this morning, the C. N. R. party being accompanied by officials of the St. John & Quebec Railway.
