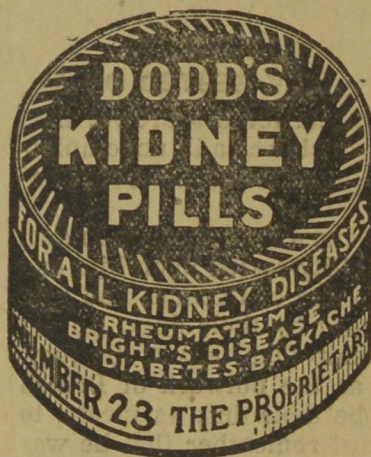

THROUGH NOON TRAIN, ST. JOHN TO HALIFAX

Nos. 13 and 14 Trains to Run Between St. John and Halifax—To Make Boston Connections.

Time Table changes effective on Canadian National Lines November 30 will affect St. John in one important particular. Trains Nos. 13 and No. 14, now running between St. John and Moncton, will run (daily except Sunday) between St. John and Halifax as through trains, and not connecting with the Ocean Limited at Moncton.

No. 14 will leave St. John at 1.40 p.m. after the arrival of the Boston train, carrying through Boston sleeper for Halifax, arriving there at 11.40 p.m. No. 13 will leave Halifax at 7.40 a.m. (except Sunday) and carry the through Boston sleeper to St. John, arriving at 5.35 p.m. This service should prove most satisfactory to the travelling public. A Standard C. N. R. Diner will run between Halifax and Moncton on these trains.

C. N. R. trains in and out of Fredericton are not affected by these train changes.

CANADIAN SOLDIER TELLS OF BOLSHEVISM IN RUSSIA

Mr. P. M. Smith, of Woodstock, Describes Interestingly the Country and Its Citizens—Was a Member of the 65th Field Battery and Saw Service in Northern Russia—The Operations of the Bolsheviki.

(Moncton Transcript.)

An interesting story is told. The Transcript by Mr. B. N. Smith, now in Moncton whose home is in Woodstock, a former member of the 65th Battery at Woodstock in the war days and who later was in Northern Russia with the Northern Russian Expeditionary Forces, going over with the 68th Battery.

This party of which Mr. Smith was a member left England in the waning days of the year 1917, and were soon in Russian territory landing in the City of Archangel, the northernmost port of Russia, a city of some 100,000 people. From here the gay little band went into Shangkursk, on the Vaga River, a city of some 3,000 persons and considered the largest city in Northern Russia outside the Port of Archangel.

Previous to their arrival in Archangel, the Bolsheviki had captured the guns of the Allied Armies which had been despatched previous to this detachment being sent forward. Here it was the influence of the Bolsheviki element was noted. The monies in the banks had been seized by this element, who claimed the reigning powers of that time, and as they flooded the country with script money beyond the amount of the gold bullion to meet the same script the country went under the Russian money of the day went into insignificance when it is recorded that a Russian Rouble, worth formerly fifty cents, in the days of the Japo-Russian War in 1905, slumped in value to 10 cents.

From Shangkursk the party returned to Archangel taking five months to make the trip with the Russian Drosky as the only mode of conveyance. The Drosky was a poor mode of conveyance as these were the smaller class of mule or donkey, so slow in build, that a person could almost step over them. Fourteen of these on an 18 pounder would be often stuck in the mud where two of our horses would easily pull the gun. Occasionally the soldiers would have to take shovels and shovel guns and droskeys out.

This band of Allied troops on arrival in Archangel found that their guns had been taken by the Bolsheviki and they had put four 18 pounders which the party had brought along with them. On January 23rd the Bolsheviki grew troublesome and opened up on them, previous to this time remaining very quiet. They retreated in the night with sixty sledges of wounded and with many of the townspeople who were seeking refuge from the havoc of the Bola. After taking retreat the party wended its way slowly and intermittently skirmishing with the Bola along the route, reaching Shakavara. Here they stopped for a day; and again moved off under darkness lest they be observed by the guerilla bands of Bola. Then the party consisted of some 80 artillery boys and some two hundred odd infantry men. Occasionally the little band would have to give warfare to the Bola, who however was no match to the organized ranks of the Allied forces, and the Bola went down to defeat; the majority of these attacks. A feature of the Bola's spirit was the manner in which he would fight. Machine guns were the principal weapons but beyond this and a hatchet these were their only warfare contrivances. A custom was to wound the enemy and then fall on him, with the hatchet, splitting him from head to foot, and many of the patrol parties met death in this manner, so that when found unless the names of those who had gone out on the party would not be recognized so badly were they mutilated. Finally the party reached Malabresnik and here after two months they were relieved, and returned again in a barge up the river to Archangel where they embarked on the "Ozarita" for Leith, Scotland, and after a few days leave in England from Camp Ripon they were forwarded to Canada on the "Winifredan."

Speaking of the law and order in the land Mr. Smith stated there were none. The people knew of no ruler. They recognized none, but paid homage to the Russian Priest, who held a sway over their wanton actions. He it was that they looked up to an adoring to his dictates refrained from desired pastimes.

Food and tobacco in fact all life's necessities were very scarce, and on arrival in the country the Russian Peasant would give the troops as high as two dollars and a half for one cigarette. For bully beef the price offered was as high as \$10. They apparently had money but could buy nothing. Finally when the script money grew so plentiful (and bullion to cover the same not in evidence) the British authorities called in the scripts in Northern Russia and cancelled it, issuing another stamped script which in reality placed the former monies of Russia of no value whatever and a rouble fell to the par value of about 10 cents. All these scripts called in were stamped and in this manner the money

so issued under the Bolsheviki and other Russian casts is being rushed from the country and this part of Russia may be revolutionized if the thirsty Bolsheviki who knows no law or order is kept down. Mr. Smith got possession of a large number of this script money and pleasantly loaned it to The Transcript. The same is on exhibition today in the windows of the office. It may be observed by bystanders and pedestrians. There are in all some twenty odd pieces. The paper is a texture somewhat as our wrapping paper. The stamp on each varies according to the denomination issued and as each element of government gained control new money was issued. In the exhibit is observed: Three ten kopeck notes. One note of the same denomination. Three fifteen kopeck notes. A fifty kopeck note and several others.

Among the rouble notes may be observed many kinds, these being issued and made changeable in color, etc., according to the government then in power.

It is an interesting collection and to Mr. Smith is due the thanks of the writer for this article on Russia and Bolshevism.
