

WINDOW WASHING.

Difficult Enough in Summer, More
Difficult in the Cold Weather.

In winter the water freezes to the glass if there is no sun—yet everyone knows that the sun makes the glass look cloudy and streaky, and windows ought never to be washed in the sunshine.

If the window must be cleaned in very cold weather, wash the glass with water in which there is a little alcohol. Wood alcohol can be used. This evaporates so quickly that it will probably not freeze. Use a chamois skin for window cleaning. Dip the chamois in clear, cold water and rub the glass thoroughly until all streaks and dirt are gone.

Rinse the chamois, wring it as nearly dry as possible and rub the glass once again. This is all that is necessary. If you do not use chamois be careful to use a clean cloth that does not readily give off lint.

Never Use Soap.

If the window, in spite of your efforts does look dirty, rub it with tissue paper. Even newspaper is sometimes used to polish glass, but it is so coarse it sometimes scratches the surface of the glass. Never use soap, as this clouds the glass.

If there are paint stains on the window, chip them off as well as possible with a knife. Get the rest off with gasoline or alcohol.

In very cold weather it is possible to prevent the forming of steam on the cold glass by going over the inside of the window with a cloth moistened with pure glycerine.

Wipe the window almost but not quite dry, leaving the barest trace of the glycerine.

RANDOM REMINDERS.

To remove black ink stains, rub them with boiled rice and wash in clear water.

All soiled clothing will wash more easily and be whiter if first soaked in cold water.

Coffee freshly roasted and then pulverized to release the aromatic oil is always best.

Keep the spout of the teakettle turned toward the back so it will not boil over and scald anyone near the stove.

To cut thin silk, lay it between two pieces of tissue paper and cut with very sharp scissors.

Dampness sometimes causes marks on mahogany. Rub the surface with a soft cloth moistened with a little sweet oil.

Attach a two-inch piece of transparent gummed adhesive tape to the lower corners of sheet music instead of bending them back. This will prolong the life of the music.

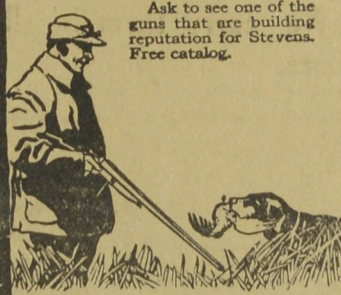
