

REVIVAL OF THE TAILOR MADE.

The Problem, According to Dressmakers is the Blouse to Go Under the Coat.

New York, Oct. 30.—There is no longer any doubt of the recrudescence of the tailored suit. It is strange that during the four years of the war America has put her money into one-piece frocks, while Paris has taken the strictly tailored coat and skirt as the uniform for the street. France admits that the American makes the best looking coat and skirt in the world, and that American women carry it off with more dash and assurance than is possible to the women of Europe. Even the English do not wear their own invention as well as we do.

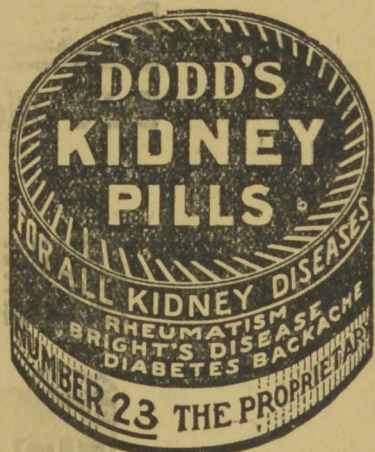
There is still a large class who prefer the one piece frock because of its economy. They insist that the coat suit does not meet the demands of the American winter climate, and that immense furs or a sweater jacket must be added to give sufficient warmth in all those latitudes where snow is not regarded as super-normal. The one-piece frock, they explain, is cool enough for house wear and can be made warm enough for the open by the addition of a cape or top coat and more or less fur.

Coat Suits Awkward Indoors.

Nobody can dodge the difficulty of managing a coat suit if one must wear it both in the open and under the roof. It is not necessary to recount to women the vexation of having to remove a coat in the house, because of the warmth, to reveal a wash blouse that is not freshly cleaned.

The way out of this problem, however, is the colored blouse and until all women accept it there will always be a question as to the serviceability of a coat suit as the mainstay of a winter wardrobe.

French tailors advance the colored or white silk jersey blouse with a short peplum below the waist. The American tailors advocate a blouse the color of the suit with a white or cream collar, a blouse that does not tuck in under the skirt belt. If one wears such a blouse there is no difficulty in removing the coat at the theatre, at a

TO CARE FOR WOUNDED

Money From Victory Loan Will Be Used to Re-establish Soldiers.

Our soldiers in France faced perils other than those of shell and gas and machine-gun fire. There was the peril of tuberculosis. Up to August last 3,909 soldiers suffering from this disease had been returned to Canada. These were placed in sanatoriums under the direction of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, and they are one of the departments of that branch that must be maintained, and come under the head of capital war outlay.

All of these men and some 20,000 others, disabled or ill, will be looked after with money raised through the Victory Loan 1919. It is the sacred duty of Canadians that the money is forthcoming.

LOCAL CUSTOMS AND HABITS

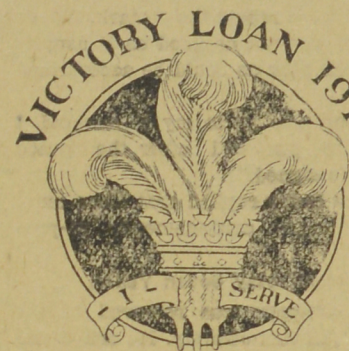
