SENSATION ON 'CHANGE

Montreal, May 16.—The greatest market sensation in years hit the Montreal stock exchange this morning. National Breweries, which has been steadily climbing for over a week, jumped from its overnight quotation of 112 to 118 at the opening this morning. In five minutes it had jumped to 120 and later went to 128.

No other stock was dealt in in the early part of the market.

The funeral will take place tomorrow morning, interment being made at Sunny Bank cemetery.

WILL BE KNOWN AS THE PHOENIX APARTMENTS

Building in Phoenix Sq. Being Remodelled by R. Chestnut & Sons.

The three-story brick building on Phoenix Square recently purchased by R. Chestnut & Sons, Limited, is being thoroughly remodelled and when the work is completed none will recognize in it the dilapidated structure which has long been an eyesore in the locality. The lower flat and basement will be used for the purposes of R. Chestnut & Sons' extensive plumbing and heating business, and the two upper flats are being converted into modern dwelling apartments. A large one-story building is being erected at the rear of the lot and will be utilized as a workshop.

The old building is being thoroughly renovated from top to bottom and is being fitted up in first class style, according to plans prepared under the personal direction of Mr. W. T. Chestnut, a man of taste and modern ideas. There will be four dwelling apartments, two on each of the upper floors, and they will be fitted up exactly alike. Each will consist of a parlor, a bedroom, a dining room, kitchen, bathroom and closets, all finished in hardwood. They will be admirably adapted for light housekeeping and that there is a keen demand for this class of dwelling is shown by the fact that all four have already been spoken for. The owners will supply a janitor service and will heat the flats by steam and have hot water available at all times. It will be part of the janitor's duty to wash ice and place it in the refrigerators of the several tenants, and he will also remove all garbage that might accumulate.

Each tenant will have a separate balcony to be erected in the rear of the building. The flats will be lighted by electricity, the cost to be borne by the tenant, but the owners will supply the light for the halls.

Plate glass windows will be installed in the lower flat and it will be used as a show and salesroom, with a suit of offices in the rear. The basement has been greatly deepened and will be extended beneath the annex now being erected in the rear.

In conversing with the Mail, Mr. Chestnut said that his firm had experienced no difficulty in finding desirable tenants for all four of the flats. In fact, they had received in all over twenty applications, which went to show that there was a keen demand for the small self-contained flat fitted up in modern style and supplied with efficient janitor service. He added that the remodelled building would in future be known as the Phoenix Apartments.

BIG MOVEMENTS TO ATTRACT TOURISTS IN N. B.

Convention to be Held in St. John on June 3rd and 4th—Delegates to be Chosen by Boards of Trade, Tourist Associations and Other Public Welfare Associations—York County Should be Well Represented.

The big movement to place cities, towns and villages of the province of New Brunswick—in fact the whole province—before the touring public of America as an admirable recreation ground, hunting and fishing resort, and in a more serious sense, a good place in which to settle down and live will be held in Saint John City June 3rd and 4th next, at which it is expected there will be some hundreds of delegates. Delegates will be elected by Boards of Trade, tourists associations and other public welfare organizations wherever they may be and the invitation sent out is a wide one a sort of clarion call to the people of this province to get together and talk over a campaign that will rebound to the benefit of New Brunswick as a whole.

Convention headquarters will be the Board of Trade suite, with the assembly place, the big auditorium of Keiths Imperial Theatre, King Square. Each accredited delegate will be required to register, will be supplied with a badge, and in a large measure will be a guest of the central executive which met some weeks ago and prepared the following programme:

At 9 o'clock on Tuesday, June 3rd, Imperial Theatre will be opened for the registration of delegates, and at 9.30 the first business session will be held with E. A. Schofield in the chair. Lieut.-Governor Pugsley, Premier Foster and Mayor Hayes, of St. John will address the convention and committees will be appointed as preliminary to the actual business of this session.

At 2:30 in the afternoon there will be a wonderful exposition of New Brunswick's natural beauties as a resort for tourists, its hunting and fishing haunts, its industrial, commercial and social life, and generally speaking a comprehensive pictorial of our province's attractive features through the medium of motion pictures. These pictures will be supplied by the federal and provincial governments, various railway constructions, guides' associations and others, most of them being taken especially for this forward movement, and of recent depiction. The motion picture show will be lectured upon by various speakers including Messrs. Johnson and McIntosh.

On the evening of the same day a banquet will be held in the Union Club at which the accredited delegates will be present, and at which Lieut.-Governor Pugsley, Premier W. E. Foster, Mayor Hayes and Hon. J. A. Murray will speak, and visiting speakers will be Dr. William Bruette, editor of "Forest and Stream," New York; Associate

Editor Travis of the same publication; Mr. Candler, transportation expert of Montreal, and other railway men.

On Wednesday, June 4th, the people of St. John will take the delegates around about the city and environs in their automobiles, showing the special advantages belonging to the metropolis of the province, and at conventions to be held in subsequent years in other parts of the province, the delegates will be familiarized with the advantages belonging to these additional districts as well.

The convention is designed to be a vigorous attempt to get the live wires of our province together for some serious talking and some concrete action for advertising New Brunswick in outside places, so that we will yet quickly back into the stride of tourist traffic and hunting and fishing business, as well as a general advertisement to people in all parts of the world concerning New Brunswick as a place in which to build a home or start a business enterprise.

The whole continent is addressing itself to these reconstruction problems and it is honestly felt that this province can accomplish much at once if its people have the spirit to do so.

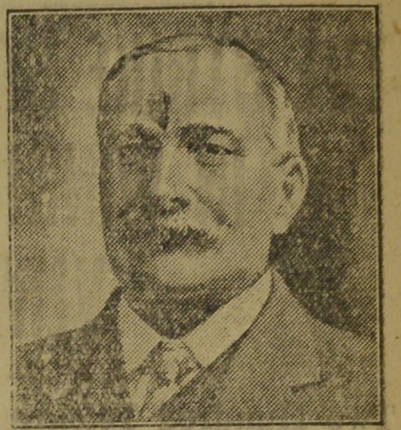

MANY CAUSES FOR UNREST AMONG TROOPS

Montreal, May 16.—Well organized soldiers councils with headquarters and wide ramifications in the various military camps were behind the recent disturbances among the Canadians awaiting repatriation in England. This belief was expressed this morning by Lieut. Col. R. C. Meurling, D. S. O. M.C., Croix de Buerre, who was in command of the troops on the transport Scotian which docked here today. The troops came from the Seaford and Rhyon Camp. Meurling said there were many causes for the unrest among the troops in English camps and chief among these was the delay in repatriation, for which no satisfactory explanation was given to the men. The trouble was also more apparent in camps where the men were not part

of one unit, but were collected from various sources. One death occurred on the Scotian, that of Private Harniman. The soldier learned just before embarking at Liverpool of the sudden death of his father, mother and sister. The next day he was missing. It is presumed he jumped overboard. He belonged to the west.

Most of the trouble occurred in the Seaford Camp. Col. Muerling said between the men who had seen actual battle experience and drafts. The latter wanted things all their own way and appointed soldiers councils who demanded that they be sent home before the fighting men. The second Canadian motor Machine Gun Brigade was off to stop any rioting. On May 6 it was thought an attack would be made on the loyal side of Seaford Camp and the machine gunners stood on duty all night with hockey sticks and cricket bats. They successfully frightened the disorderly element and were allowed to leave for Liverpool the next morning to board the Scotian. Their departure had been postponed ten times.
