AROUND THE CITY

The recent demonstration in wel-
come of returning soldiers recalls cel-
ebrations of other days. Twenty years
ago men of the 2nd Battalion, Royal
Canadian Regiment, were returning
from South Africa after taking part in
the campaign which culminated in the
Battle of Paardeberg and the surren-
der of General Cronje's Boer army.
The men returned in small detach-
ments not more than three or four at
a time reaching Fredericton but the
town cut loose in great style. On one
midsummer night in 1899 a crowd of
several thousand people waited in a
pouring thunderstorm for a delayed
train carrying among others Bruce
McFarlane of Fredericton, Herb Leav-
itt of Gibson and Sam Jones also of
Fredericton who lost this life in the
war just closed. Bands which turned
out were the Royal Canadian Regi-
ment fife and drums, the 71st York
Regt. Band, the bugle band of the
same regiment and the West End life
and drum band. Of course Fredericton
has only one active band now and the
length of the Great War has taken the
edge off of receptions to returning sol-
diers but still many think that the city
has lost the "pep" it once had and that
is the reason celebrations are tamer.

Why do many people in this section
speak of any horse-drawn vehicle as
a team? The point arose at a recent
inquest. Is the expression used in any
other part of the country in that sense?
Of course every person who uses the
expression will admit that it takes
at least two horses to make a team
and yet they will speak of a "single"
team when meaning one horse and its
attached vehicle. Others apply the
word even to the vehicle.

Fredericton's main street, Queen
Street, throughout much its length
has business houses on but one side.
Some claim that is the reason why
crowds walking upon the street always
stick to the south side and practically
never walk on the side next the Nor-
mal School, Post Office and Barracks.

Stanley and the surrounding district

Smith, the Secretary of the Social
Service Council. At the Baptist church
Cross Creek a large congregation
turned out to hear him. The Presbyter-

original cannon used by the U. N. B.
students was discovered by accident
and exhumed from the place in which
it had long been buried. Lt. Col. Mer-
sereau who recently returned from
overseas is credited with being the
discoverer of the old weapon which
was thought to be French at the time
of its discovery. It is said to have been
buried in the yard of a boarding-house
which accommodated a number of
college students. The excavation was
carried on at night and during the day
was covered by a pile of brush. Finally
the gun was unearthed and taken to
the university. Since that time each
senior class has taken over a cannon
from the out-going graduating class
except in the event of the cannon hav-
ing been blown to pieces during firing.
In that event a new gun has been pro-
cured by purchase or otherwise. Since
the original cannon was blown up by
too generous application of powder
small ship-guns, mortars and foundry
cast guns have been used at the college.
On some occasions when a cannon has
been blown up too early in the cele-
bration, blasts have been set off in
the ground to make the required noise.
A number of years ago a cannon was
purchased in St. John but was found
to be spiked. It was taken to the New
Brunswick Foundry now the Smith
Foundry to be drilled out. After being
drilled it lay in the foundry-yard and
some members of the Fire Department
resenting some false alarms for which
they held the college boys responsible
respected it. This caused a day's post-
ponement but the gun was again drilled
out and used.
