Began Duties Today in Forest  
Classification Branch—For-  
estry Graduate of  
U. N. B.

The New Brunswick Department of Lands and Mines today announced another appointment of a returned soldier to the staff of the Forest Section. The latest appointee is Private Harry L. Holman of St. John who today joined the forest classification Branch. Private Holman is a graduate in forestry of the University of New Brunswick of the year 1915. He has had extensive experience and has received a flattering offer from the Dominion Forest Service but prefers to remain in his native province.

While attending the U.N.B. Private Holman spent his vacations at practical forestry work, in 1912 with the New Brunswick Railway Company's Forest Service, in 1913 with the C. P. R. Natural Resources Department in 1914 with the Dominion Forest Service. In 1914 he enlisted and saw extensive service overseas.

## W. A. PLEDGE TO EDUCATIONAL FUND INCREASED

SENT TO HIS HOME

Devon Youth Remanded to Jail  
for Burglarious Entrance of  
Dwelling—Previous  
Bad Record.

Sedwick Hayman the young St. John boy who was reported missing from his home some weeks ago and who was located at the Barker House in this city acting as bell-boy, appeared in the Police Court this morning on the charge of theft. The boy since coming to Fredericton has had a bad record stealing at the hotel and also outside. One of his thefts was of a bicycle. The theft for which he was arrested was of money from the clothing of other boys who were bathing at the West End beach.

Magistrate Limerick gave the boy a severe caution and stated that he would send him back to his mother at St. John with a jail sentence pending should he ever return to Fredericton.

### Remanded to Jail

A young boy named Howland belonging to Devon was arrested yesterday by Town Marshal Hayes for theft. The boy appeared before Police Magistrate Limerick and was remanded to jail. The boy has had a bad record as far as thefts are concerned. The offence for which he was arrested was the entering of a dwelling in Devon and the theft of a watch, some money and other articles.

### Not Intoxicating Liquor.

Police Magistrate Limerick yesterday afternoon delivered judgment in a case in which a man was charged with violation of the Intoxicating Liquor Act, 1916, by having liquor in his possession. The prosecution maintained that the lemon extract found on the person of the accused was intoxicating liquor under the act. His Honor took the ground that the extract was not intoxicating liquor, and dismissed the case.

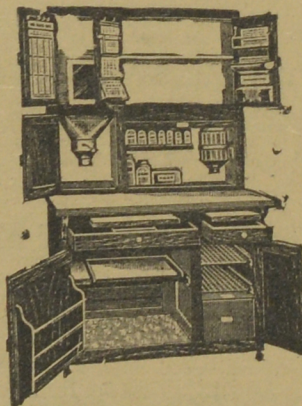
