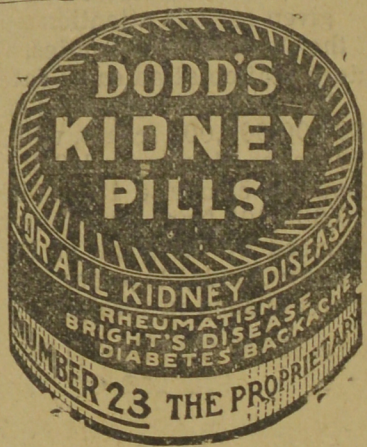

## SAYS HUNS WILL NOT FORGIVE OR FORGET

Weimar, Germany, Feb. 15.—Philipp Scheidemann, the chancellor in the new German government today showed himself able to handle conflicting demonstrations in the new national assembly with no sign of being intimidated by the wildest opposition, or moved by the most severe heckling.

No speaker since the meeting of the national assembly was opened has been so outspoken toward his opponents. One of the incidents of his speech was his reference to Austria's desire to join Germany. He said: "We desire no reluctant adherents, and by the same token nobody wishing to join us should be prevented. 'There was almost a threat in his warning: 'the Entente is able to force any kind of peace on Germany, but if it is an unjust peace, seventy million people in their hearts will never forgive or forget'."

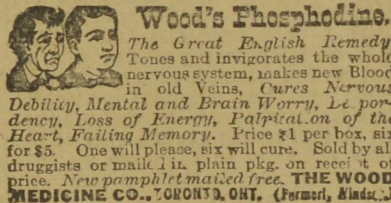
## THE NOBLE ART OF MANNERS

Also a pamphlet expressing France's gratitude for his services. Every subscriber to a French war loan was presented with an engraved certificate of honor signed by President Poincare. What other government would have thought of taking the pains to recognize its obligation in this felicitous personal way?

Attentions of this sort humanize relations between governments and individuals. They warm the heart France has given the rest of the world an inspiring lesson in the practice of official tact and courtesy.

Now they shudder—in public and with their press agents at hand to see—at the very suggestion that the bar should ever come again. The evils of intemperance appal them—but not enough to lead them to go out of the liquor-making business. They have become sudden converts to opposition to the open bar, but they desire legal sanction for a system which while it would have no place for the bar-keeper and drink mixer, would protect them in the manufacture and sale of the liquors which destroy decent business, ruin homes, fill jails, and take life. The Hun tried hypocrisy, distillers in Canada are trying the Hun trick. It must fail again. Nothing less than the complete abolition of the liquor business in Canada will do.

## 250 SOLDIERS AMONG MEMBERS OF NEW BRITISH PARLIAMENT

Edward Price Be lcaables the Chicago News as follows:

London, England, Jan. 21.—War influences will tell in the new house of commons. Of the 703 members elected 250 served in the war, and the whole British membership owes its election to war services of one sort or another. All ranks of the army are represented from general to sergeant.

Decorations for valor will adorn the new house abundantly. Scores of distinguished service orders and military crosses will be topped by one Victoria cross. This supreme reward for gallantry was conferred on Lieutenant-Commander Dean of Blackburn for his part in the Zeebrugge raid. He will be welcomed to the house of commons by two of the old members who shared in the raid—Commander Hamilton Bann of Greenwich and Lieutenant-Commander Hilton Young of Norwich, who lost an arm in the attack on the mole.

Not only the army and the navy but the industries of the war will have their representatives among the legislators. Douglas Vickers, head of the great armament firm; Admiral Adair of Glasgow, head of the gun department at Beardmore's; Sir Hallowell Rogers of Birmingham, chairman of the British Small Arms works, and a number of great men in other lines of business essential to the prosecution of the war will take oath in the house.

Dominion statesmen will be there, notably Sir Frederick Young of Swindon, who formerly sat in the South Australian legislature; Maj-Gen. Sir Newton Moore of Islington, formerly premier of Western Australia, and D. MacMaster of Chertsey and Cathcart Wason of Orkney and Shetland, who

## POLITICS IN GREAT BRITAIN

(Toronto Star.)

The Manchester Guardian, which, though not always agreeing with Mr. Lloyd George, is friendly, says that the bottom fact of the political situation is that he has to deal with a Tory House of Commons and a Tory government. Among the forces behind him are the forces of property, capital, the landed interest and the drink interest. These will all tend to make him conservative in any measures he may introduce. Other forces referred to are those of organized labor and the returned soldiers.

Labor is stronger in the country than in parliament. The attitude of the returned soldiers is an unsolved problem. Old fashioned Liberalism represented by such men as Asquith, is not ranked among the forces. It is defeated, but not extinct, polling a considerable vote under very unfavorable conditions. It may tend to grow as the war spirit dies away. Liberalism was almost destroyed during the Napoleonic wars, but in peace it gradually gained leadership and energy and effected many reforms. The future will show new alliances and new political alignments.
