4 teaspoons of a liquid equal 1 table-  
spoon.  
4 tablespoons of a liquid equal ½ gill  
or ¼ cup.  
½ cup equals 1 gill.  
2 gills equal one cup.  
2 cups equal 1 pint.  
2 pints (4 cups) equal 1 quart.  
4 cups of flour equal 1 pound, or 1  
quart.  
2 cups of butter, solid, equals 1 lb.  
½ cup of butter, solid, equals ¼ lb.  
or 4 ounces.  
2 cups of granulated sugar equal 1 lb.  
2½ cups of powdered sugar equal 1 lb.  
1 pint of milk or water equals 1 lb.  
1 pint of chopped meat equals 1 lb.  
10 eggs, shelled, equal 1 pound.  
4 tablespoons of flour equal 1 ounce.  
8 eggs with shells equal 1 pound.  
2 tablespoons of butter equal 1 ounce.  
2 tablespoons of granulated sugar  
equal 1 ounce.  
4 tablespoons of butter equal 2 ounces  
or ¼ cup.  
4 tablespoons of coffee equal 1 ounce.  
1 tablespoon of liquid equals a half-  
ounce.

sident of Kingsclear, is now mayor  
of the town of Sandpoint, in the state  
of Idaho, while Mr. Ernest Kitchen, a  
Prince William boy, is chief of police  
in the same town. Mr. Elliott is a  
son of the late Mr. Joseph Elliott, of  
Marysville, and a brother of Mr. Fred  
Elliott of Upper Queensbury. Mr. John  
Elliott, of Kingsclear, is his uncle. He  
has been in the west fifteen years and  
has made good in commercial life as  
well as in civic politics.

Mr. Kitchen is a son of the late Mr.  
Samuel Kitchen of Prince William,  
and a brother of Mr. Solomon Kitchen,  
of that place. He has been in the  
west about fifteen years.

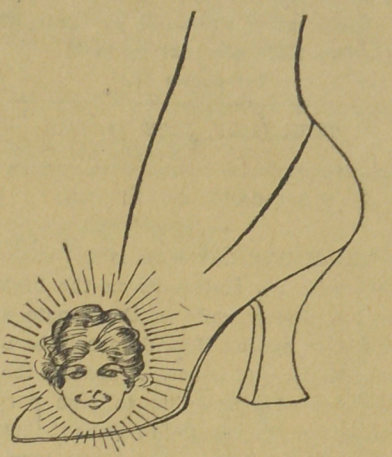
The Pend D'Oreille Review, a news-  
paper published at Sandpoint has the  
following sketch of Mayor Elliott:

"E. J. Elliott, Sandpoint's new may-  
or, was born in New Brunswick, Can-  
ada, in 1876. He spent his early youth  
on the St. John river, where he learn-  
ed his trade as a boatman and sailor.  
He was for 14 years with one firm

there. He was for five years in Maine  
and, returning to New Brunswick, he  
came directly from the Canadian pro-  
vince to Sandpoint in November, 1904.  
He organized the Northern Naviga-  
tion Company in 1906 and in 1907 he  
built a steamer, the Northern, which  
was the nucleus of the fleet of five  
boats now owned by his company and  
used in passenger and towing service  
on Lake Pond d'Oreille. The steam-  
er Western was built in 1910 and in  
1913 the old steamer Rustler was se-  
cured and entirely rebuilt and the  
same year the company bought the  
Bay View from the Washington Brick  
& Lime Co. The Northern, Western,  
Rustler, Bay View and Marguerite M.,  
the latter purchased in 1914, make up  
the fleet of the company and do nearly  
all the passenger and towing work of  
the lake. For the past eight years the  
company has done nearly all the tow-  
ing for the Humbird Lumber Co. and  
the Dover Lumber Co. Mayor Elliott  
is president and general manager of  
the navigation company which recent-  
ly added to its lake work the manu-  
facture of ties with the construction  
and operation of a tie mill on the  
lake shore. Mr. Elliott's first advent  
into local politics was two years ago  
when he was elected alderman from  
the Third ward. He was elected mayor  
at the recent election by a heavy vote  
over his two competitors.
