DOMINION PARLIAMENT MAY SOON TAKE ACTION

A Request From Ottawa for an Outline of the Collective Bargaining Issue—Winnipeg City Council in Favor of Making Sympathetic Strikes Illegal in Manitoba — Strikers are Maintaining a Firm Attitude.

Winnipeg, May 28—The first formal indication of possible action by the Dominion parliament was received here this afternoon. A message from Major G. W. Andrews, Winnipeg member of the Federal House of Commons was received by Mayor Gray, in which Andrews asked that an outline of the collective bargaining issue be sent him immediately.

Talks No Action

The city council at the special meeting today did not take any action upon the question of resuming street car service tomorrow. The matter will again be considered tomorrow.

The council stands on record in favor of legislation to make sympathetic strikes illegal in Manitoba and will formally transmit these recommendations to Premier Norris.

One hundred members of the Winnipeg citizens' committee, including several prominent business men, told the council today that they will man garbage wagons tomorrow to help clean up the city.

Firm Attitude

Winnipeg, May 28—Despite the fact that officials of every branch of government affecting Winnipeg have characterized the general strike of local labor unions a move engineered by a few men for the purpose of causing a national revolution, the strikers outwardly maintained a firm attitude today.

While serious moves were made to smash the control which executives of the Winnipeg Trades and Labor Council have on the local unions, the strike leaders were active in outward movement to intensify the movement of unrest. "Spread the strike" has been one of the front page slogans of the Western Labor News.

To Confer at Ottawa

Arthur Meighen, federal minister of the interior, who was here several days will probably arrive in Ottawa tomorrow to confer with Premier Robert Borden, regarding the local situation and its tremendous effect on dominion tranquility.

Meighen recently denounced the methods of the strike leaders and like Minister of Labor Gideon Robertson who is still in Winnipeg, he has said he believed the underlying scheme of the strike was an attempt to turn public opinion against the government to defy federal efforts to maintain law and order and then, during the tumult to attempt to overthrow dominion and political authorities.

The only move towards conciliation today was an offer by members of the Canadian Railway Brotherhoods to arbitrate disputes.

No action was taken on the suggestion.

A Big Change

This is a different Winnipeg than it was immediately after the opening of the general strike, on May 15. For nearly three days the central strike committee continued its mobilization plans without serious outward opposition from the federal, provincial, and municipal government, or the military not until an effort was made to control the city food supply did aggressive opposition begin. Since then all public utilities and services except the street cars, have been entirely or partially restored. Business is going on in all commercial lines, although under the handicap of partly nominal facilities of communication and transportation. All local newspapers here resumed publication. From the standpoint of municipal services a dent of considerable size has been pounded into the striking front but the disturbance which began as a Winnipeg strike has ceased to be a local proposition.

Edmonton and Calgary have semi-general strikes and threatened walk-outs may take place at Toronto, Port Arthur, Regina, Saskatoon and other places. It is understood, however, from authoritative remarks that government officers regard the strikes in cities west from here as engineered by persons connected with the Winnipeg movement.

Fight in Winnipeg

"We will fight this thing out in Winnipeg" is one remark credited to Minister Robertson.

The postal situation is receiving considerable of Mr. Robertson's attention. Postal employees numbering more than seventy-five have been hired to replace striking employees who have been discharged for refusing to obey Robertson's command to return to work. Nearly all of the new employees fought for Canada in the war. Similar action has been promised by the labor minister if the Winnipeg railway clerks who struck last night fail to report for duty "within a short time."

Robertson intimated today that similar action may be necessary in other parts of the dominion.

The Minister appointed three chauffeurs this week for the light road trucks, each one being a returned soldier. Others will be appointed as the trucks are put in commission in the different sections of the province.

Disinterested Testimony

The Minister showed the reporter several letters from disinterested parties residing in different sections of the province on the splendid condition of the roads. He permitted the reporter to take an extract from one written by a doctor which is as follows.

"I have been forty-one years a physician travelling night and day, and I can say the roads have never been better. I drove a motor thirty-two miles in one and a half hours and found only one little bad spot. I merely wish to give this to let you know some one appreciates your good work."

This refers to roads through sections of Westmorland and King's County.

LIVELY TIME AT MEETING OF I. O. D. E.

Montreal, May 29—Charges that a verbatim copy of the minutes of the National annual meeting cost \$50 that these were marked by omissions, that the records were not available at the time and that there were other irregularities which were not calculated to inspire confidence, were made by Lady Kingsmill, National Councillor of the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, at the afternoon session of the annual meeting here yesterday.

These charges led to a spirited discussion lasting nearly two hours, and speakers were frequently called to order.

C. N. R. TRAINS ARE AFFECTED

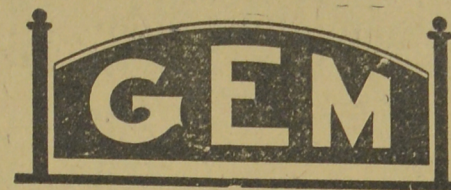
Chapleau, Ont., May 29—Trains over the Canadian National Railway are feeling the effect of the extending strike situation.
