SOME FISH SALADS.

At least this arrangement of courses has occurred at dinners given by hostesses who pride themselves on their flawless nospitality, and the result has been entirely satisfactory. Of course, most of us aren't worried much about the fish course anyway, beeause in the simple home dinner if there is fish there is no meat, and if there is meat there is no fish; but for a Friday dinner, when you want to have a simple menu, and want to have fish, why not try one of these fish salads as the piece de resistance?

With a soup to begin with and then French fried potatoes or home-made Saratoga chips served with the salad and a dessert, you would have quite enough for the simple dinner. Here re the fish salads.

Salmon Salad.

One quart of cooked salmon (or one ean) two heads of lettuce, two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice, one of vinesalt, one-third of a teaspoonful of pepper, one cupful of mayonnaise dressing or the French dressing. Break up the salmon with two silver forks; add oter cold place for two or three hours. Prepare the lettuce as directed for lobster salad At servin.g time pick out leaves enough to border the dish. BRIEF BUI USEFUL RECIPES.

Restore Gilt Frames.-Rub with a sponge moistened with turpentine. Drive Away Ants.—A little quick lime placed in the infested places.

Remove Tar from Cloth—Rub it well with turpentine till every trace is removed.

Make Leather Waterproof.—Satur ate it with castor oil; to stop shoes squaking, drive a peg into the middle

Clean the Hair.—Wash well with a mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda 1 ounce; cream tartar 1/4 ounce. Egg Stains on Spoons.—Rub with common salt.

Clean Gloves.—Pour a little benzine and rinsed in a fresh supply Hang in the air to dry.
Clean Hair brushes.—Dissolve a lit

tle soda in warm water and pour in a small amount of amonia. Hold the brushes with the bristles downward cover with a French dressing. Heap and avoid wetting the back as far as possible; shake until the grease is removed; then rinse in cold water and
