## CLAIM THAT 95 PER CENT HAVE QUIT WORK

Washington, June 11—Union lead-  
ers claimed that about 95 per cent of  
the forces employed by the Western  
Union and Postal Telegraph Compan-  
ies here walked out today in compli-  
ance with the strike order issued sev-  
eral days ago by S. J. Konenkamp,  
President of the Commercial Tele-  
graphers' Union. Company officials  
early today had not definite figures  
as to the actual number of men who  
left their keys but estimated it at  
much below the figure claimed by the  
strike leaders. They claimed service  
was not seriously crippled.

The following telegram signed by  
W. H. Marcon, of Abern, B. C., was  
read at the Presbyterian General As-  
sembly on Saturday and handed to the  
committee on home missions for con-  
sideration:

"Dare the Assembly stand for the  
Master's teaching of co-operation and  
brotherhood, and join the Methodists  
in demanding the only remedy, the  
public ownership of the means of  
wealth production? The whole world  
is groaning under the present system  
and demanding relief. What would be  
His words today? God does not make  
our laws. We do. The Church should  
lead in this momentous matter. Do  
you want revolution?"

## WILL BE NO CHANGE IN THE PRICE OF CLOTHING

Toronto Dealers Are Incensed Over Statement Given Out at  
Ottawa That There Would be a Cut in the Price This Year  
—No Relief in Sight at the Present Time for Those Who  
Must Buy Clothing.

(Toronto Times.)

Toronto clothing and woollen men  
are heartily against the views ex-  
pressed in the morning papers that  
the Cost of Living Commissioner con-  
siders that clothing prices are due for  
a big drop. The local men have plenty  
of figures and facts to back up their  
arguments and the substance of the  
matter, as they see it, is that clothing  
prices may drop, but—in about two  
years' time.

The manager of the woollen depart-  
ment of a large dry goods house in  
Toronto, told The Times today that  
Canadian manufacturers were begging  
the wholesale houses to cancel orders  
placed for delivery next autumn and  
winter.

"I had two letters last week," he  
said "from Canadian weavers asking  
to be released from orders, totalling  
sixty thousand dollars, which were to  
have been completed in September  
and December. The labor situation re-  
garding wages and the difficulty of  
keeping machinery up to standard are  
given as their reason for requesting  
release."

#### Profits Have Been Cut.

"What would be the proportions of  
cost in a suit costing \$60?" The Times  
asked this authority.

"Materials would consume at least  
half of it, wages for labor about one-  
third and trimmings and tailor's pro-  
fit the balance," he replied, "but tail-  
ors are making less profit on a sixty  
dollar suit now than they did on a  
thirty dollar suit three years ago.  
Within a year the journeymen tailors  
have struck for higher wages which  
has almost doubled their earnings of  
fifteen months ago and now they are  
talking of striking for a thirty per  
cent increase. How can clothing come  
down in price when the chief factor  
which is keeping the price inflated is  
taking steps to make the situation  
more acute?"

The manager of another large wool-  
len house told the Times that he had  
received only last week notice of ad-  
vances in the prices of Canadian Wool-  
lens which ranged between 5 and 7½  
per cent. On top of this came advices  
of advances of 10 per cent from manu-  
facturers abroad.

"There is a factor which the public  
do not consider," he said. When they  
talk about the high price of clothing,  
and that is the enormous stock of wool-  
lens that have been destroyed during  
the war. Heretofore a woollen suit  
was torn up and mixed with cotton and  
then made into felt before it vanish-  
ed from sight, but it will take about  
two years to restore the market to a  
condition where cast-off woollen cloth-  
ing can be made into by-products."

#### Australia May Help.

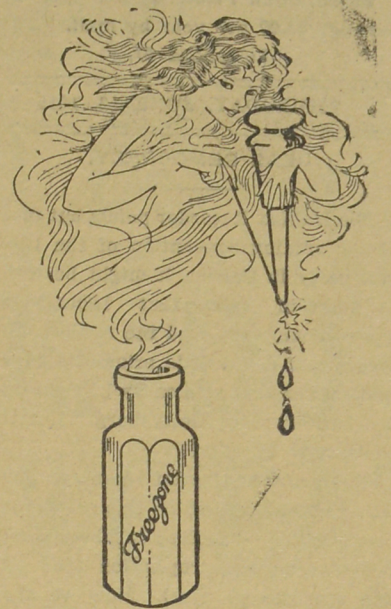
Hope from Australia is seen by an-  
other local woollen expert. He draws  
attention to the fact that the C. P. R.  
is putting on two swift new leviathans  
between Vancouver and Sydney,  
Australia.

"There are enormous stocks of wool  
in the Southern parts of the Empire,"  
he stated, "and vast spinning plants  
have been opened near Melbourne dur-  
ing the war. This will allow of Aus-  
tralia shipping finished or semi-finish-  
ed material to us, whereas the raw  
wool went to England in the old days.  
I see a very considerable ray of hope  
in this factor for the future, but for  
the immediate present, I cannot see  
how the Commissioner in Ottawa ar-

of the crowd.

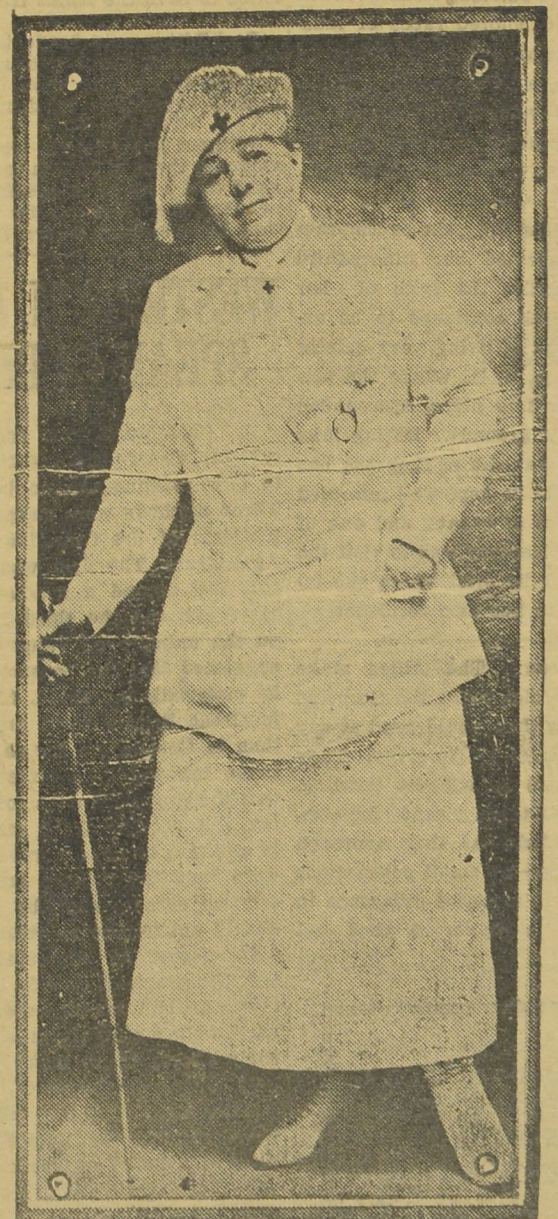
"Now," said the orator, "here we
