## HAWKER AND GRIEVE THOUGHT TO HAVE BEEN LOST

**Intrepid Airmen Who Started From Newfoundland in a Death-Defying Trip Across the Atlantic Failed to Reach Their Destination—A Sopwith Machine Said to Have Been Seen South of Ireland—Weather was Bad.**

London, Tuesday, May 20.—The admiralty has issued a notification from the admiral at Queenstown saying that the report that Hawker's machine was down forty miles west of the Shannon river is considered unreliable.

London, May 19.—(By the Associated Press)—London spent the day in tense excitement and suspense waiting the result of Hawker's bold attempt to fly across the Atlantic, and after a day of anxious inquiries and unverified rumors and speculation, the fate of the gallant aviators, Hawker and Grieve is still unknown.

A Sopwith machine supposed to be Hawker's, according to an admiralty wireless report, descended to the surface of the ocean forty miles west of the mouth of the Shannon. Later admiralty reports said that this information was not considered reliable.

**Boisterous Weather**  
The early unverified reports had it that the Sopwith machine encountered a gale which reduced its speed to forty miles an hour, and finally compelled it to descend owing to exhaustion of gasoline.

Crowds of people waited the day long at the Brooklands airfield where Hawker learned to fly believing that the aviator would make his landing there, although experts had expressed the opinion that Hawker would unlikely be able to fly there.

The fate of Hawker and Grieve cannot be definitely stated, and tonight it is impossible even to assert that the machine found at sea is Hawker's.

The weather off the Irish coast Monday was boisterous with rain and haze. The admiralty has sent out all ships possible to search for the aviators.

**Mysterious Message**  
London, May 20.—According to the Daily Mail, admiralty quarters in Queenstown when questioned at 11.15 o'clock last night, denied receiving a wireless despatch from the Castletown station saying Hawker's machine had been seen forty miles west of the mouth of the Shannon, or any other wireless.

Moreover, it was asserted, the especially sensitive wireless plant at Ballybunion, on the northwest coast of County Kerry, Ireland, did not receive the message.

The admiralty in London is investigating the mystery.

**The Alleged Message**  
London, May 19, 10.20 p.m.—The British admiralty has received a wireless message that Hawker's machine has been found in the sea forty miles off Loophead, at the mouth of the River Shannon. It is not stated whether Hawker was found. The admiralty statement adds that Hawker's machine has been picked up.

Loophead is the most western point of County Clare, and is on the south central part of the western coast of Ireland. The mouth of the River Shannon is guarded by Loophead on the north and Kerry Head on the south. Loophead is about eighty miles west of Limerick, which is about seventy-five miles north of Fermoy, where Hawker intended to make his first Irish landing place.

**A Limerick Report**  
London, May 19, 8.32 p.m.—The Exchange Telegraph Company says that according to a wireless message received at Limerick Aviator Hawker was seen flying 400 miles off the Irish coast.

It will be noted that the above despatch was filed from London nearly forty-five minutes prior to the 9.18 p.m. despatch which reported Hawker had fallen into Dingle Bay.

coast. It was added that all was well with the Sopwith machine. No time is given for the Limerick despatch.

**The First Report**  
London, May 19, 10.45 p.m.—It is reported that Hawker is missing. A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Londonderry reporting Hawker as missing, says destroyers have been ordered to search for him.

**Doubtful Despatch**  
London, May 19, 11.08 p.m.—Aviator Harry Hawker is reported to be safe according to a Central News despatch from Tralee, Ireland.

The despatch adds that Hawker dropped into the sea forty miles from Valencia, off the west coast of County Kerry and south of Dingle Bay.

## A POPULAR RESORT FOR TOURISTS

Mrs. F. C. Strang of Camp Knot-a-Kare, which is located on the New Brunswick side of the boundary a few miles above Vanceboro, was in the city yesterday, a guest at the Barker House. Mr. and Mrs. Strang have been carrying on business at Camp Knot-a-Kare for eleven years and number among their patrons many American tourists and sportsmen. The camps are located on a chain of lakes, which offer excellent sport in the fishing of trout, bass and land-locked salmon.

A motor boat which conveys patrons to and from the railway station at Vanceboro is connected with the camp. The completion of a highway road from Harvey to McAdam now makes it an easy matter for Fredericton people to reach Vanceboro by motor car.

Mrs. Strang says that hitherto the camps have catered to American trade but there is ample accommodation there for New Brunswick people who want a first class outing with some sport thrown in. The service at the camps is first class and guides are always available for fishing trips. Parties who contemplate visiting the camps should notify Mr. Strang at Vanceboro by letter of telegram.

**TO COMPLETE REGENT STREET**  
"Missing Link" Will be Tarviated—  
Repair Work to Begin Next Week  
—Street Committee to Form  
Plan Early in June.

One of the important matters which will be undertaken by City Engineer McDowell this summer will be completion of the "missing link" in the tarvia pavement of Regent Street, the unpaved section between Brunswick and King streets. When the street was paved in 1914 operations began at the C.N.R. tracks and when Brunswick street was reached the proceeds of the bond issue had been exhausted and the next block was not laid with tarvia.

At the present time the Street Department is patching some of the streets with gravel and levelling them up with the road plow. Next week if the weather is favorable repairing of Queen street will begin.

The Street Committee is expected to meet early in June to form a plan for the season's operations.

**Lieut. Belyea's Case Finished**  
The case against Lieut. John Belyea in connection with the New Brunswick Depot Battalion shortages, was completed yesterday. Mr. J. A. Barry counsel for the accused addressing the court martial urged that the accused had been placed in the position in which he was by the fact that he had never questioned the instructions given him by the president of the canteen committee and the officer commanding. The court in summing up evidence stated that only facts placed before the court could be considered. Capt. G. E. Logan's case is the next.

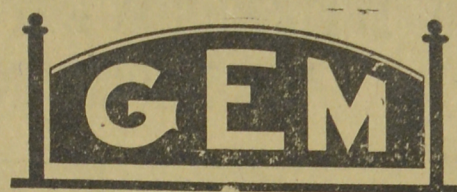
**Killed Four-Hundred Pound Bear**
