CLEANING KITCHEN UTENSILS.

Many New Kinds Have Come on the Market in Recent Years.

The problem of caring for a variety frequently becomes rather complex.

When enamel saucepans and iron frying pans were the only cooking utensils in common use the scrubbing of pots and pans was a daily rite.

But the joy of some of these newer utensils lies in the fact that they do not need scouring. Aluminum ware, the glass baking dishes and pottery do not require scrubbing. In fact, to the unnecessary scrubbing is due their prematurely scratched appearance.

Some women even scrub aluminum ware with gritty powders and metal scrub cloths that are used for coarse iron utensils. Naturally the more delicate surface of the aluminum scratches and its original brightness is lost.

Washing Aluminum.

Aluminum utensils that have been used with reasonable care can be washed just like dishes—with hot, soapy water and a dish mop. It is only when they have been allowed to become scorched or have been permitted to stand for some time without bits of food being thoroughly scraped from their sides, that it becomes difficult to clean them in this way. Then more friction must be applied than the soft dish mop affords.

First immerse in hot soapy water for some time to loosen the fragments. If signs of scorching still remain, rub with a soft cloth which has first been sprinkled with some fine, non-gritty cleansing powder or rubbed on a cake of such a cleanser. This will be sufficient friction to thoroughly cleanse the aluminum.

If you want to restore a good polish to your aluminum ware, give it the same treatment as you give silver. A thorough polishing with some good silver polish will make your aluminum ware look as good as new.

Glass and Crockery.

The glass and pottery cooking utensils should also be cleaned easily with hot sudsy water and the dish mop.

They yield more readily to this treatment for thorough cleansing than most other cooking utensils, for they present a smooth glazed surface which needs little friction for cleansing.

Occasionally, however, if these baking dishes are allowed to scorch they get browned or blackened so that they require more strenuous treatment. Then the cleansing powder must be applied and will quickly remove all signs of scorch and burn.

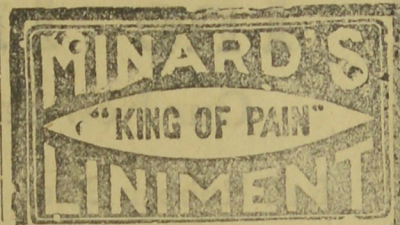
On taffeta frocks chambray is, modishly used as trimming.



BRIEF BUT USEFUL RECIPES.

Restore Gilt Frames.—Rub with a sponge moistened with turpentine.

Drive Away Ants.—A little quick lime placed in the infested places.

Remove Tar from Cloth.—Rub it well with turpentine till every trace is removed.

Make Leather Waterproof.—Saturate it with castor oil; to stop shoes squaking, drive a peg into the middle of the sole.

Clean the Hair.—Wash well with a mixture of soft water, 1 pint; sal soda 1 ounce; cream tartar ¼ ounce.

Egg Stains on Spoons.—Rub with common salt.

Clean Gloves.—Pour a little benzine into a basin and wash the gloves in it, rubbing and squeezing them until clean. If much soiled, they must be washed again through clean benzine and rinsed in a fresh supply. Hang in the air to dry.

Clean Hair Brushes.—Dissolve a little soda in warm water and pour in a small amount of ammonia. Hold the brushes with the bristles downward and avoid wetting the back as far as possible; shake until the grease is removed; then rinse in cold water and put in the air to dry.

Remove Mildew from Cloth.—Put a teaspoonful of chloride of lime into a quart of water, strain it twice, then dip the mildewed places in this weak solution and lay in the sun. If not effective the first time repeat.

How to Remove a Rusty Screw.—Apply a red hot iron to the head for a short time, the screw-driver being applied immediately while the screw is hot.

Cure Mosquito Bites.—Put ten drops of refined carbolic acid into an ounce of rose water; shake well and apply. (If you hold your breath while a mosquito has its bill in you it cannot withdraw it until you breathe again.) the part stained and lay on it some salt of wormwood; then rub without diluting it with more water.
