### AN AMERICAN TRIBUTE.

The New York newspapers all published full reports of matters pertaining to the five days' visit to that city of the Prince of Wales, besides devoting considerable editorial space to His Royal Highness. The New York Sunday Herald in a farewell tribute to the royal visitor had this to say:

"It is with keen satisfaction that the people of this city realize that the visit of the Prince of Wales may be described truthfully as one of the most satisfactory events of the sort in the history of this metropolis. Now that her guest has departed, Mrs. Knickerbocker may sit back and reflect comfortably that the party was a great success and have the additional pleasure of knowing that she enjoyed it all as much as her visitor.

"Everything went off beautifully. There was not a hitch in the arrangements. In fact, it might be said that as far as perfect cordiality and evident pleasure on both sides were concerned, nothing could have been better. There was no stiffness, no snobbishness, no adulation. The city treated its adopted son with affectionate regard and he showed plainly that he was having the time of his life. The police were on duty, not to guard him, but simply to keep a passage open.

"What happened was very simple. New Yorkers looked Prince Edward over and liked him. They heard him make his own speeches and liked him still more. He looked at the New Yorkers and their town and liked both. And so an entente cordiale of a very curious and unusual sort was formed between a stranger and a community of all sorts and conditions of men and women.

"But as for the future? This young man, who has inherited his grandfather's peculiarly interesting gifts—gifts which were of incalculable service to the civilized world in bringing France and England together against the evil day of German aggression—is bound to have plenty of opportunity to do service to human freedom. He says that he has the will; we believe that he has the ability. As head of the democracy that produced Edmund Burke and John Bright, he will know from personal experience the democracy that produced Abraham Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt."

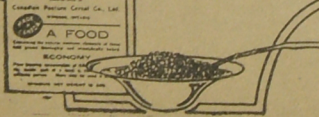

## TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE AT MARYSVILLE

Marysville, Nov. 25.—A meeting of those interested in the temperance cause was held last evening at the Methodist Church. A fairly representative number were present. Rev. J. J. Pinkerton, Pastor of the Church presided and introduced Rev. F. E. Boothroy of St. John, field Secretary of the Temperance Alliance. The speaker outlined the intentions with regard to the holding of a referendum in the Province on the Prohibition Act within the next few months and urged those present to organize for the contest. Reference was made to the publication by local daily papers of articles dealing with the Prohibition Act most of which it was stated were opposed to the Act and were copied from one paper to another. An auxiliary to the Alliance was then formed to which the following were elected: President Mayor Stafford, Vice President, Norman Cochrane, Secretary Treasurer, G. A. Tapley, Executive with power to add, Mrs. George Eno, Miss Ida Shaw, Miss A. G. Ramsey, Messrs. Fred Bailey, Rowley Manzer, S. J. Hallett, and Horace Pugh.

## REFERRED TO OLD GLORY AS A DIRTY RAG

Rutland, Vt., Nov. 25.—An alleged anti-American incident reported by nurses at the Rutland Hospital, is to be subject of inquiry at a joint hearing by a committee of the board of aldermen and the directors of the hospital tomorrow night. The incident as reported to the aldermen developed from an alleged conversation between Miss Annie McLane, of Woodstock, N. B., and Miss Marion Niles, an American girl both nurses at the hospital. Miss Niles, it was said, had shown a postcard picture to Miss McLane, remarking on its beauty, when the Canadian girl agreed, but added, "except for that dirty rag," referring to an American flag which had a prominent place in the picture. A spirited argument between the nurses followed, and the incident was called to the attention of Miss Annie Aitken, superintendent of the hospital, who is a sister of Lord Beaverbrook of Canada, with a demand by American nurses that Miss McLane apologize.

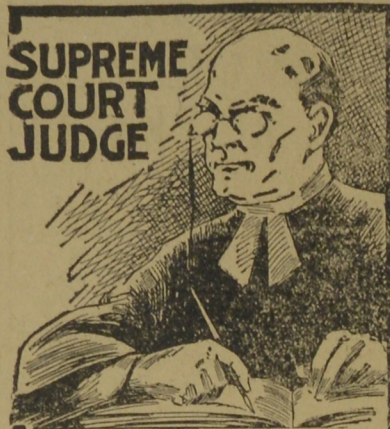
When the apology was not forthcoming the American nurses went on strike as a protest, but returned subsequently.

Miss McLane is now said to be at her home in Woodstock, on leave of absence. American nurses assert that she has not yet apologized, and on their representations Alderman Pencher brought the matter before the city fathers for inquiry.

### Search and Its Result

Yesterday a local merchant was closeted with Magistrate Limerick and when he left a warrant was issued to the police to search the house and person of a resident of Westmorland Street. The merchant stated that he had left a bag with several hundred dollars in gold at his store and shortly afterward when he went back to the store some of the gold was missing and he was ready to swear that the other man had stolen it. On the power of the warrant the residence and adjoining buildings belonging to the man were searched but resulted in no gold being found. When the owner of the dwelling returned home he heard of the search and while he could not blame the police for acting on instructions he was very wrathful against the merchant. It was stated this morning that the case would probably result in a warrant being issued against the merchant for swearing to false information.

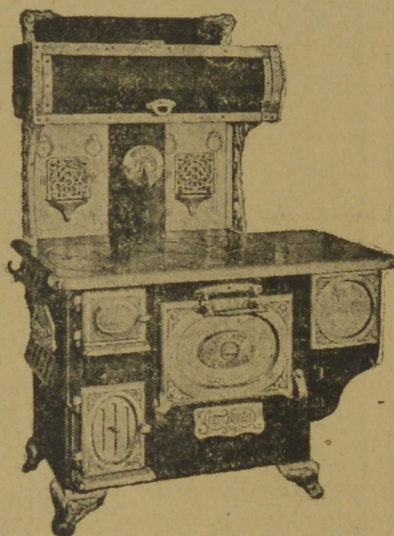

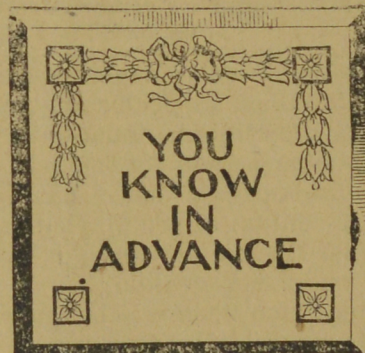

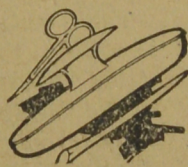
