WINTER WASHING.

Much More Troublesome Than Those of Summer.

Even if the wash days are clear they are usually frosty and clothes that freeze faster than they dry are troublesome to manage. It would be a pleasant thing if all households were so arranged that wash day could be delayed until fair and mild weather prevailed. Since such an arrangement is impossible, indoor drying is to some extent necessary in cold weather.

Fine lineries must not be dried outdoors on a windy day that is cold enough to freeze. The combination of freezing and heating proves too much for the clothes. They freeze stiff and are beaten against one another and the line and literally break.

Such things must be dried in the house and if a clean attic or empty room can be used for a drying room, the task is much simplified. The windows should be opened and the heat should be turned on, so that the air will be fresh and dry.

Dry Woolens in the House.

Woolens, too, should be dried in the house on very cold days. The secret of drying woolen so that it will not shrink lies in drying it quickly. It should be hung in a warm dry room, but it should never be dried so rapidly that you can see steam rising from it, as this very rapid drying shrinks it.

It is a good idea to iron woolens before they are quite dry.

The best way to wash woollen goods of any kind is to use warm water and soap dissolved in a little hot water. No board should be used, but the woolen should be moved constantly about in the water and rubbed and squeezed between the hands. Then it should be wrung out, rinsed thoroughly in clear warm water, wrung dry again and hung up. Pure, good soap should be used.

Woolen stockings and similar garments should be hung by the legs and not by the toes, as hanging by the toes increases the size of the holes. They should be ironed on the wrong side, if ironed at all.

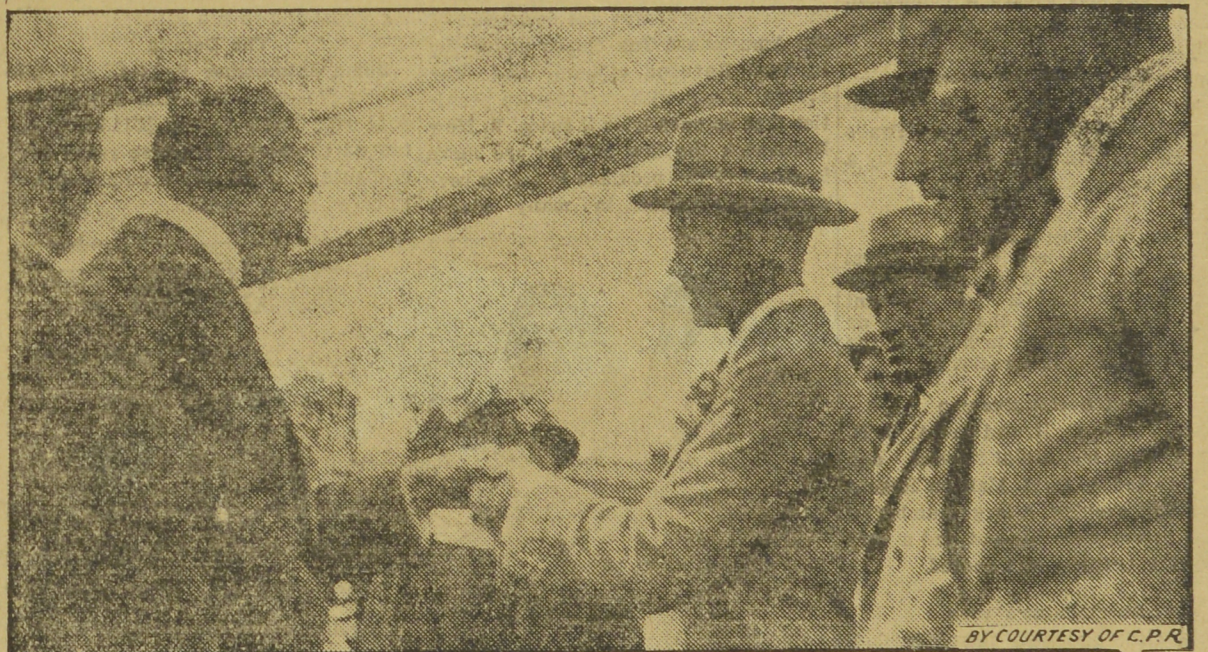
"I have all the papers," said Donald, "and in none of them do I find that Mrs. Lafferty has made any statement. There is only one article bearing on the affair." Then he read:

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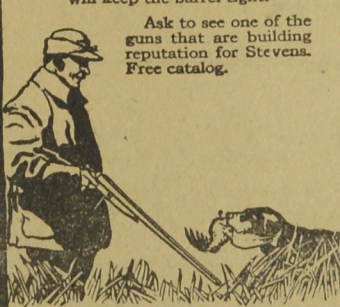
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
