TORY EDITOR'S VIEW.

Editor Malaney of the Tory Woodstock Press, was one of the speakers at a big farmers' picnic held at Somerville, near Hartland, last week. The picnic was under the auspices of the United Farmers, and naturally enough most of the speakers took a whack at the tariff and condemned the profiteering which has been disclosed by recent parliamentary investigations. The published report of Editor Malaney's speech, which apparently emanated from a friendly source, is given by the Woodstock Press as follows:

"Mr. Malaney referred to Mr. Hagerman's remarks upon the necessity of financial aid to the branch stores, and pointed out that the farmers of this county had about \$500,000 in the banks in Woodstock drawing three per cent interest, some of which money should be invested in the branch stores. He was in favor of a tariff for revenue only, not a tariff that cuts off competition and encourages the clothing men to make 300 per cent profit, the flour men to make 75 per cent, the farm machinery men 75 per cent, and the cold storage men to make 50 per cent profit. New Brunswick required protection not so much from the United States as from the Upper Canadian combines that closed the doors of the Woodstock tannery and other industries and has made this province a dumping ground for Ontario manufactures. He denied that the newspapers of Canada had been bought up by the grafters, but under the restrictions of the War Measures Act they were unable to look after the interests of the people, because, it was said, 'if an agitation was started it would give encouragement to the enemy while the war was in progress.'"

The above is pretty straight talk, coming from one who in 1911 opposed reciprocity on the ground that it would destroy the fiscal independence of Canada and work injury to the infant industries of Ontario, which had been fostered by the National Policy. We are glad to note that Editor Malaney has at last seen the error of his ways and is seeking to make amends for the wrong done the people of Carleton in the days when he was compelled—reluctantly, no doubt—to act in the capacity of a blind guide.

The editor is certainly to be congratulated on the words of wisdom which he spoke to the United Farmers at Somerville, and it is to be hoped that he will keep up the good work until the combiners, in fear and trembling, are compelled to come down from their perch and re-open the doors of the Woodstock tannery.

Telegraph: In New Brunswick Hon. Mr. Veniot has made great headway in his efforts to bring the roads up to a high standard. It is a task that cannot be accomplished in a day, but those who have travelled over the highways of the province are loud in their praise of Mr. Veniot's department for the improvement which has been noted during the last two years. At the Dominion Roads convention in Quebec, A. W. Campbell, so often called "Good Roads Campbell," spoke particularly of the work being done in this province by Hon. Mr. Veniot and expressed hearty approval of the plans

for future road construction submitted to him by the minister and his road engineer.

William Hohenzollern, the former German Emperor, will be brought to England in a British ship and imprisoned in the Tower of London, according to the Daily Mail. The death penalty will not be sought, the newspaper points out, but if he is found guilty the Allies will ask his banishment for life to a remote island, following the precedent of Napoleon's exile on St. Helena. The international trial court is intended to try the former Emperor alone, but it is possible, says the Daily Mail, that the former Crown Prince Frederick William will also be arraigned before it.

In supplementary estimates brought down at Ottawa yesterday provision is made for the purchase of the following railways at prices not exceeding the amounts given: York and Carleton Railway, \$18,000; St. Martins Railway, \$65,000; Moncton and Buctouche Railway, \$70,000; Elgin and Havelock Railway, \$30,000; the Salisbury and Albert Railway, \$75,000, and an interest amount of \$34,000 up to March 31, 1920. A further amount of \$250,000 is set aside for improvements in St. John.

The Great War Veterans' Association now in convention at Vancouver, has passed a resolution calling upon the Federal government to pay a generous bonus to all soldiers who served during the late war. They ask that \$2,000 be given to those who served at the front, \$1,500 to all who went overseas, and \$1,000 to soldiers who remained in Canada. To carry out the terms of the resolution would involve an expenditure of about \$700,000,000.

With members expecting the end of this session of parliament on Saturday, the government brought down yesterday supplementary estimates totalling \$36,723,120.67, which raises the total estimates for the year to \$474,602,192, with the prospect that in the fall session the total expenditure for the country in the year 1919-20 may rise as high as half a billion dollars.

The Municipal Council of York County this morning decided to increase the fees of petit jurors under the New Jury Act by two dollars per day and to place the fees of grand jurors at three dollars per day. The increase is conditional on the agreement of the Fredericton City Council to the increase.

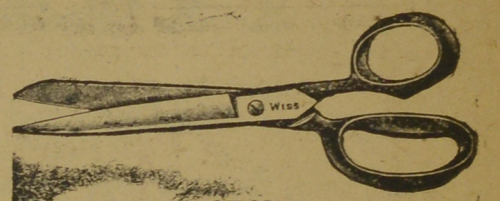

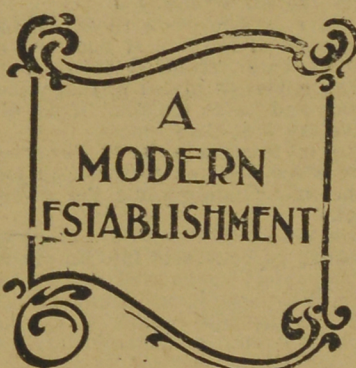
