## ACTION RE MUNICIPAL HOME IS POSTPONED UNTIL THE JANUARY SESSION OF MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

Revision of By-law Begun—Proposed That Plebiscite be Held on Question of Establishing Home Not Favorably Received—Many Councillors Want September Elections to Decide Whether County Will Act as Whole or Not—Towns and Parishes Favoring Proposal May Act Independently.

Action on the matter of a Municipal Home was postponed by the York County Council Thursday afternoon, when a vote was taken which was decidedly in favor of waiting until January before deciding whether or not to establish such a home. Whether the Towns of Devon and Marysville and the parishes in favor of the establishment of a Municipal Home at once, will wait, remains to be seen. During Thursday afternoon's session the council heard brief addresses from ex-Warden Timmins and ex-Warden McMullen. The revision of the bylaws was considered and substantial progress made.

The Municipal Council resumed its session at 2.30 p. m. Thursday.

### Ex-Wardens Speak

Warden Hallett drew attention to the fact that two ex-Wardens J. F. Timmins and Wm. McMullen were present and invited them to seats by his side. He also asked them to speak.

Ex-Warden McMullen said he had listened with interest to the discussion on the proposed Municipal Home. It was a matter which had been frequently considered and he would express no opinion. He hoped the action taken in the matter would be in the county's best interests.

Ex-Warden Timmins expressed his thankfulness because of his ability of once again visiting the Municipal Council. He heartily congratulated Warden Hallett on his elevation to the Warden's chair, York County he felt always would do its full part in anything. With the cessation of hostilities York County he trusted would experience a period of prosperity.

### Municipal Home

The motion to postpone consideration of the Municipal Home question until after January was considered.

Coun. Stairs asked if a majority vote on the matter definitely decided it.

County Solicitor Richards said that legislation placed the matter in the hands of the council. He did not see that the county could be broken up with each parish acting independently.

The motion was carried on the following vote.

Yea—P. Graham, Stairs, Manuel, Fox, Everett, R. Graham, Inch, Christie, Jones, Frank Smith, Nason, Cowperthwaite, Wetmore, Denison, B. H. Clarkson, Grant, Smith—17.

Nay—Thompson, Dougan, Pickard, Allen, Walker, Alex. Brewer, Seymour Anderson, White, Pond—10.

Coun. Allen said that towns and parishes favorable to establishing a Municipal Home, after this vote could act in their own rights.

### Plebiscite Not Wanted

Coun. Pat. Graham moved that a plebiscite be taken in all the Parishes on the question of a Municipal Home. There was no seconder.

When asked who would pay the expenses, Coun. Graham said the county.

### Reports Presented

Coun. Walker reported for the Printing Committee that McMurray Co. had been awarded the contract and recommended that the minutes be printed in pamphlet form and distributed throughout the county.

Coun. Fox reported for the Public Accounts Committee giving an itemized statement of expenditure of \$229.65.

Coun. Dougan reported for the committee on the Secretary Treasurer's Accounts, to the effect that all was correct.

The reports were adopted.

### Refund to Parish

Coun. Pond moved that the sum of twenty-eight dollars for burial expenses of an unknown pauper in Stanley Parish be refunded by this county. Such refund was customary.

Coun. Alex. Brewer objected. If such were the custom Douglas should receive refunds for three burials of bodies found in the River St. John.

Coun. Pond quoted instances of such refunds and his motion was carried.

Coun. Alex. Brewer said bills would come in from Douglas.

### Motion Picture License

Coun. T. W. Brewer pointed out that motion picture shows were travelling throughout the county without license. As twenty-five and thirty-five cents was charged for inferior entertainments steps should be taken to impose license fees.

Coun. Alex. Brewer said the matter could be considered when revision of the bylaws was before the council.

Coun. Grant said he believed provision for licensing shows already existed. He knew fees had been collected

in Canterbury and forwarded to the Secretary Treasurer.

### Revision of Bylaws

Revision of the bylaws was taken up. The council went into committee of the whole. Coun. Alex. Brewer in the chair.

County Solicitor Richards read the revised bylaws section by section and amendments were made as required. Coun. Fox moved that the Committee on the Secretary Treasurer's Accounts be of nine members instead of a Councillor for each parish.

Coun. Pat. Graham opposed the motion. He took the ground that it was necessary for the Councillors to get acquainted with county business through that committee.

Coun. Fox withdrew his motion.

Coun. Inch suggested that the date of the biennial election be changed to the last Tuesday of September.

Coun. B. Clarkson opposed the suggestion because the last of September would bring the election into the harvest season.

Coun. Pond objected that many electors would be in the lumberwoods late in September.

Coun. Inch's suggestion in the form of an amendment was defeated.

### Hour of Closing Polls

There was general discussion on the matter of all polls, but No. 1 in each parish closing at 1 p. m. on election and No. 1 poll closing at 4 p. m. the weight of opinion making 4 p. m. the uniform closing hour.

Coun. Seymour seconded by Coun. Allen moved that each candidate be required to make a deposit of twenty dollars with the parish clerk.

This was carried.

## MR. CARVELL AND OTTAWA CITY COUNCIL

Ottawa, July 2—The House started somewhat rapidly over various items on the order paper this morning in view of the projected wind-up at the week end.

Hon. Dr. Reid presented his bill regarding electric and power companies. He explained that it embodied simply the contentious clauses eliminated from the general Railway Act to permit of it being passed by the two Houses.

For the past two sessions the Senate has passed a bill against Judges serving on Commissions, but no one will father it in the House. This morning Mr. Fielding moved the bill "as a matter of courtesy to the Senate."

On the orders of the day a number of queries brought cryptic answers from the government.

Had the health department been organized yet, Mr. McKenzie asked, and Sir Robert Borden said not yet but that steps to that end were being taken.

Mr. Lemieux queried again if the principle of promotion would be followed in filling the vacant commissionership of customs.

"I cannot add to my previous statement," said the Premier.

Then Mr. Proulx asked if the Highways Bill was to be dropped. He hoped not.

Again the Premier had nothing to add to what he had said before.

Mr. Lemieux asked if the Nile voyageurs were to be pensioned and Sir Robert replied that his attention had not been directed to the matter.

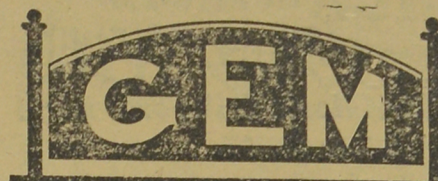
### Mr. Carvell Criticizes

Ottawa came in for some hot shot from Mr. Carvell when Mr. Lemieux noted that the City Council of the Capital was at a deadlock with the Government over a proposed payment of \$75,000 a year for certain civic services.

"If it were not for the Government Ottawa would be Bytown with nothing but a few saw mills," said Mr. Carvell. "There isn't anything on earth they do not want. Practically every man and woman is drawing something directly from the Government and now they want something indirectly."

The Minister conceded that the city should get regular rates for its water but the other bills it presented he favored but little. However, the Government was prepared to give them \$75,000 for ten years and have Government leasehold property taxed.

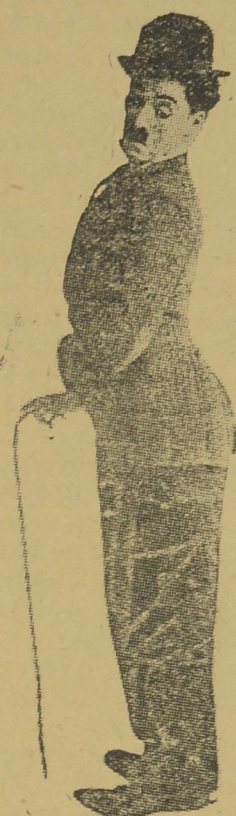
