

SUCCUMBED TO PNEUMONIA IN ENGLAND

**C. S. M. WALTER TENNANT
DIES AFTER LONG SERVICE**

**Youngest Son of Late James
Tennant of Fredericton, and
One of Three Brothers
in C. E. F.**

Mrs. Harry B. Atherton received a telegram this morning from the Military authorities at Ottawa containing the sad news that her brother, Company Sergeant Major Walter Tennant, of the C. E. F. had passed away in No. 5 Canadian Hospital at Liverpool England. Sergt. Major Tennant was the youngest son of the late Mr. James Tennant of this city, and went overseas with a British Columbia Battalion in 1915, and had nearly four years of active service to his credit. He was awarded the Military Medal for gallantry in the field and also won the Italian Bronze Medal. He was twice severely wounded, but recovered and was on service in Scotland with a forestry battalion last October when he contracted pneumonia. He had never fully recovered from this disease and at the time of his death was undergoing treatment in the Canadian Hospital at Liverpool preparatory to embarking for Portland, Me., in a hospital ship.

Fine Young Man

Sergt. Major Tennant was a fine young man and a good soldier, and the news of his untimely death has occasioned great regret among relatives and friends in this city. He left his home fourteen years ago and located in British Columbia where he had made good. He was one of three brothers to see active service in the late war.

Surviving Relatives

The late Sergt. Major Tennant was thirty three years of age and unmarried. He is survived by three brothers, Archie Tennant of Vancouver, Norman Tennant of Yach, B. C., and James Tennant of this city, and three sisters, Mrs. H. B. Atherton of this city, Mrs. Albert McArthur of St. John and Mrs. Henry Gill of Fall Creek, Wisconsin.

JURY FEES INCREASED BY COUNTY COUNCIL

**CONDITIONAL ON CITY
COUNCIL'S CONSENT**

**Improvement to Magaguadavic
Lake Road Desired—New
Garage Said to be on
County Land.**

The council resumed business at 10 a. m. Friday.

Better Road Needed

Coun. R. H. Graham draw attention to the necessity for a better road to Second Magaguadavic Lake on account of the fishing club there.

Coun. Manuel agreed and suggested a petition to Hon. P. J. Veniot Minister of Public Works for improvement of the road.

Coun. Dougan strongly supported the proposition, an improved road would increase the membership with increased advantage to the people of the district as much money was left by the fishermen.

Ex-Warden McMullin being asked, for an opinion said the road was in bad condition. Cars scarcely could go over it and motorists had to leave their cars and reach the club house by horse and wagon. An expenditure of \$500 would make the road passable.

Alleged Encroachment

There was discussion concerning the garage being built at the corner of Court House Square and Campbell Street, the statement being made that it encroached on county land. It was decided to have a survey made and if it were found that the building encroached on county land, to require the owner to pay rent to the county.

Dog Taxes

The Secretary Treasurer reported that in 1918 the amount collected in dog taxes was \$1,414.12 and so far in 1919, \$256.40. Payments on claims for sheep killed amounted to \$275.97 leaving a balance of \$1,385.55. Collectors receive ten per cent.

Jury Fees

Consideration was given the fees of jurymen under the New Jury Act.

Coun. Everett moved that petit jurors be paid \$2 per day in addition to existing fees and that grand jurors be paid \$3 per day, on condition that the Fredericton City Council agree to the increase in fees.

The motion was carried after lengthy discussion in which varying opinion was expressed. Some councillors said the expense should be borne by the province and not the municipality. Some even expressed the opinion that grand jurors should not be paid.

Coun. Alex. Brewer said that men owed some public duty to the municipality and should serve as grand jurors without recompense.

COMMISSION FOR EVIDENCE IN DIVORCE CASE

**MISS FLORA GRANT OF
McADAM CANNOT ATTEND**

Plaintiff on Stand in FitzRandolph Case—Witness Wanted on Plaintiff's Side is Missing.

The evidence of Miss Flora Grant who is managing a hotel at McAdam will be taken by commission at that place either Saturday or Monday, in the divorce action of Charles FitzRandolph vs. Elizabeth FitzRandolph. Miss Grant has been subpoenaed but claims that her health will not permit of her attending court. Mr. S. D. Simmons, official court stenographer will go to McAdam to report the evidence of Miss Grant.

Witness Missing

Another witness who is wanted by the plaintiff's counsel in this case is Miss Margaret McCluskey who was a domestic at the home of the plaintiff and defendant. It was she who found a letter which purports to have been written to the defendant by a gentleman residing in Ottawa at the time. Miss McCluskey gave the letter to the plaintiff after the defendant had left the home. Mr. Gregory counsel for the plaintiff intimated that the missing witness had been removed to a place where a subpoena could not be served upon her. Dr. Baxter counsel for the defence objected to the admission of the letter.

Plaintiff on Stand

The plaintiff was on the stand yesterday afternoon and this morning His evidence was along the same line as that given at the first trial. Mr. Baxter gave him a severe cross-examination. One new point was that Mrs. FitzRandolph while in England with her husband after he had been wounded in France, received a cheque for one hundred pounds from a mutual friend in Canada who is the same as the writer of the letter found by the domestic in their residence. The witness said he knew of the cheque being received but did not approve of it. He denied improper relations with Mrs. Dedham a friend of himself and wife in England or with any other woman. 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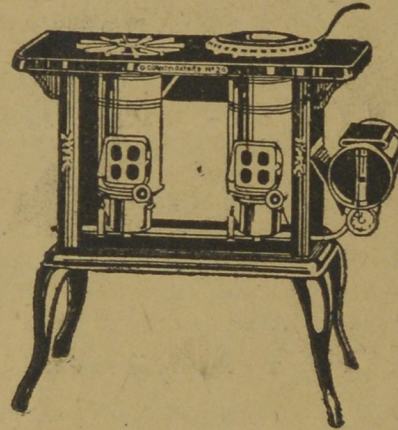
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
