LIBERALS ARE PREPARING FOR A GREAT CONVENTION

Reports From All Over Canada Submitted at Ottawa Gathering Show That the Party is Once More United—An Election Soon in P. E. Island New Brunswick Delegates Submit a Cheering Report.

Ottawa, May 18—Liberal premiers ministers and leaders of the opposition sufficient to represent all the provinces except Manitoba, informed D. D. MacKenzie leader and his parliamentary advisory committee at a conference held here yesterday that at Liberal meetings held all over Canada since the armistice both conscriptionist and voluntary service Liberals had appeared and worked side by side. So far as the great majority of the rank and file of Liberals in the country was concerned, the hatchet had been buried with regard to conscription, and the feeling was that all should unite again to do their utmost for the triumph of Liberal principles in the conduct of the nation's affairs.

When reports had been received as to the state of the Liberal organization in each of the provinces, it became evident that all the local Liberal associations in the provinces east of the great lakes were still intact and already promoting actively preparations for the coming national Liberal convention in Ottawa in August next.

Plan of Representation

As this condition does not exist in the western provinces, it was decided to recommend that the provincial ridings which are more numerous, that the general ridings should be made the basis of organization. It was stated, however that this would not interfere with the published plan of having the federal ridings appoint three delegates and three alternatives each for the convention.

The main object of the conference yesterday, however was to discuss the question of the appointment of a convention committee to be associated with the parliamentary committee in drafting agents for the national Liberal convention.

This committee will be composed for the most part of members of parliament and senators who live near enough to make frequent trips to Ottawa but all the provincial Liberal governments and Liberal oppositions are asked to designate representatives so that united action suitable to all sections may be secured.

P. E. I. Elections Coming

In answer to Mr. MacKenzie's request that the representatives from the provinces should give their opinions as to the best procedure in preparation for the coming convention, and as to the local situation in each province, J. H. Bell, leader of the opposition in the Prince Edward Island legislature and a member of the house of commons for four years, said that provincial elections are expected in his province within a month. The indications were that the Liberals would be successful, but until that was over the Liberals would discuss federal politics very little. After that the ridings would become more active in the federal cause.

In Nova Scotia

For Nova Scotia, John H. Sinclair explained the plan last fall to get united action among all elements opposed to union government. A meeting was called of all the Liberal candidates, whether conscriptionist or not at the last federal election. That was a start and since then a basis of co-operation had been arrived at after all matters had been thoroughly gone into.

Mr. MacKenzie here remarked that although Liberals had divided in his own constituency over the conscription issue, they had remained friendly and had united again as soon as the contest was over.

New Brunswick Men

When the New Brunswick delegates were called upon it became immediately evident that both on the Atlantic and the Pacific Canadian electors are kind to the King family.

Senator G. G. King was at the conference with two sons, one a member of the New Brunswick legislature, George H. King, and another son, Hon. James H. King, minister of public works in the British Columbia government. Senator King related that forty years ago as a member of the house of commons he had voted against the national policy as not in the best interests of Canada. During the forty years it had been in operation events had deepened his conviction that it was a bad policy for Canada. Another New Brunswicker present was Dr. Hetherington. Addresses on the situation in New Brunswick were also made by the following federal members: Messrs Pius Michaud, A. B.

Copp and O. Turgeon, all predicting that a goodly delegation would come to the convention from every New Brunswick constituency.

Quebec Situation

Sir Lomer Gouin, premier of Quebec, gave an optimistic address as to Liberal prospects in the federal arena and pledged the full support of his ministers and himself at the convention. Addresses were also made by Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, Hon. Jacques Bureau, Frank S. Cahill, Dr. J. E. Fontaine, J. A. Robb, Hon. H. S. Beland, E. B. Devlin and L. J. Papineau.

For Ontario Duncan Ross, Hon. Chas. Murphy and I. E. Pedlow federal members in the Ontario house, spoke words of hope. Mr. Proudfoot referred to the provincial Liberal convention to be held on June 25 and 26 to prepare a platform for provincial Liberals, discuss organization, and select a leader. He would not presume to prophesy as to whom would be the leader after that date, but for himself personally he would say that he was heartily in accord with the national Liberal convention and would do all he could to make it a success. The plan for calling delegates together was wide and comprehensive and would give an opportunity for all shades of public opinion to be represented in the gathering.

In the West

Because of the strike in Manitoba neither Premier Norris nor any member of his government had been able to come. As for Saskatchewan Mr. MacKenzie explained the views expressed to him and members of the committee by members of the Saskatchewan government that by the next election unity would prevail among the Liberals of that province. They were heartily in accord with the plans for the convention.

W. H. White, M. P.; Hon. J. R. Boyle minister of education, and Hon. Duncan Marshall, minister of agriculture told how at the Liberal convention, in Alberta last fall Liberals had shown their willingness to co-operate again even though it was just after the armistice. They intended to work along these lines and they had the authority of Premier Charles Stewart to promise full co-operation. He had said so himself when present in Ottawa a few days before.

British Columbia

A letter from Premier John Oliver of British Columbia, regretting his inability to be present, was read. The letter approved of steps already taken for the convention and introduced as his representative to the meeting Charles L. Campbell, secretary of the British Columbia Association, as well as Hon. Dr. King. Both spoke of efforts being made in their province to re-establish on a firm and permanent basis the Liberal organization of British Columbia.

Most of the representatives at the conference yesterday have gone home again. Another conference will be held with Hon. W. E. Foster, premier of New Brunswick; Hon. W. M. Martin, premier of Saskatchewan, and Hon. O. T. Daniels, attorney-general of Nova Scotia, who were not able to get here in time for the conference on Saturday.

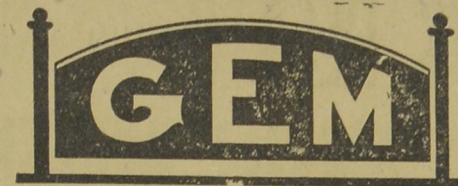
The whole matter will be taken up with Premier Norris and the Manitoba government as soon as the labor troubles now tying up Winnipeg have been settled.
