# MEXICANS ARE OBTAINING AIRPLANES FROM GERMANY

**Twenty-four War Type Machines Have Been Mobilized and More are Being Purchased — Pilots from German Army Will Operate Them—President Reserves Judgment on the Mexican Situation—Wants to Examine the Evidence.**

Washington, Dec. 5.—President Wilson today reserved judgment on the Mexican situation until he could examine evidence submitted by Senator Fall, of New Mexico, on which the senator based his charges that the Mexican ambassadors and consuls in the United States had distributed "Red" propaganda in the United States.

Senators Fall and Hitchcock conferred with the President for nearly an hour.

Senator Fall said in reply to questions that he was entirely satisfied with the president's condition and with his ability to handle the Mexican situation.

While the president did not say directly that he would communicate with congress on the Mexican situation, the senator gained the impression that he would have some advice to give before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee meets Monday.

### Mexican Airplanes Ready

Mexico has twenty-four war type airplanes mobilized at Chihuahua City alone, and is obtaining additional planes from Germany according to war department information given to the house military committee today by Brigadier-General Mitchell, chief of operations of the army air service. The department also has information, Gen-

eral Mitchell said, that former pilots in the German army are arriving in Mexico for service in the army air forces there.

### Jenkins Released

It was announced at the state department that the advices from the embassy said Jenkins had been liberated last night from the penitentiary where he had been held pending trial on charges of giving false information regarding his abduction by Mexican bandits in October. Consul Jenkins returned immediately to his home.

### Bandits Operate

Zapata, Texas, Dec. 5.—Mexican bandits last night raided the Clarence Ranch on the American side of the Rio Grande eleven miles southeast of here, escaping into Mexico with provisions from a store on the ranch.

The number of bandits in the raiding party was not determined but they were reported heavily armed. The only person molested was the storekeeper, whom they bound and gagged before looting the store.

Austin, Texas, Dec. 5.—Adjutant General Cope today ordered the company of Texas Rangers stationed at Laredo to proceed to Zapata county, report to the sheriff and work in co-operation with the local authorities in attempts to apprehend bandits who crossed over from Mexico and looted a store there last night.

## SUMMARY OF MORNING NEWS

Washington, Dec. 5.—Senator Hitchcock announced today that President Wilson had no intention of withdrawing the peace treaty from the Senate for the present. The President thinks the failure of the Senate to act on the treaty at the special session shifted the responsibility in the matter to other shoulders.

Paris, Dec. 6.—The peace treaty between the allied and associated powers and Hungary is ready for signing, the Supreme Council having adapted economic, financial and reparation clauses today.

The Supreme Council also approved treaty provisions regulating the frontier between Poland and Czechoslovakia which places eastern Galicia within the boundaries of Poland.

London, Dec. 5.—C. B. Cockrane, promoter of the Carpenter-Beckett fight, announced today that Georges Carpentier had signed an agreement to fight Dempsey next year. The purse will be \$35,000 pounds.

Chicago, Dec. 5.—Virtually the entire country was struggling tonight to make the best of more abnormal conditions than prevailed during the war as a result of the drastic measures being prescribed daily to partially counteract the prolonged strike of miners in the bituminous coal fields.

New York, Dec. 5.—As a counterblast to the mission of the Ulster delegation which arrived in New York yesterday to campaign against Sinn Fein propaganda in the United States, De Volers, President of the Irish Republic, has issued a statement stating that the party he represents stands as much for truth and justice as the Unionist delegation.

London, Dec. 5.—The House of

Commons tonight passed the third reading of the Indian Bill, giving India a measure of self-government.

London, Dec. 5.—A wireless despatch from Berlin says the newspapers of the German capital have been authoritatively informed that the Berlin authorities know nothing whatever of reported impending forcible measures by the Entente such as an ultimatum with reference to the signing of the protocol.

London, Dec. 5.—Lord Robert Cecil says he does not think the suggested alliance between Great Britain and France and the United States, guaranteeing assistance for France in case of future aggression by Germany, would materialize. Such alliances, he declared, always broke down just when they were wanted.

Montreal, Dec. 5.—Canadian Railway Board announces that there will be no general wage increase to employees of Canadian railways.

## VALUES OF REAL ESTATE IN DEVON ARE RISING

**Owners Holding for Even Better Offers—Lots Have More Than Doubled in Price.**

The real estate boom in Devon which has been caused by the expectation that the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company will erect a pulp mill near the mouth of the Nashwaak River within the near future and also that a canning factory will be established in the southern end of the town, is continuing.

Reports are current that lots which were purchased for two hundred dollars are being held or sold for five hundred dollars.

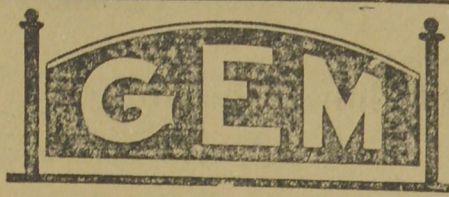
The greatest advance in value reported is that of a property which was purchased by a resident of South Devon for \$2,500 and for which he has refused an offer of \$7,000.
