

THE SUGAR SITUATION

New York, Nov. 1.—The situation as to supplies of refined sugar for present consumption in manufacturing as well as general use is slowly but steadily improving. In spite of the dockmen's strike, refiners are getting in enough raws to work at least 50 per cent of capacity. The Distributing Committee is thus able to make allotments on a somewhat better scale than heretofore.

The market for new crop Cuban raws is decidedly strong and higher. Late on Mondays sales were made to trade buyers of between 10,000 and

15,000 bags for first half of January shipment at 8c f.o.b. Cuba, and on Tuesday 8½c was reported to have been paid by manufacturers for the same position. Canada has taken 125,000 bgs for shipments extending from March to June, inclusive, at 7½c f.o.b. American refiners do not appear to be buying. With a crop estimated at 4,000,000 tons, it is figured there will be plenty left after buying as fancy prices slows down.

Weekly Roll Off.

About sixty-two bowlers were qualified for the weekly roll-off at the Palace Alleys last evening with "Rock" Paynter leading with a score of 125 followed by "Doc" Kelley with 124 and "Bun" Williams with 123. The ten-team bowling league starts this week, lasting until December 17th.
