OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

FOR THE COOL WEATHER.

With the Passing of Warm Weather the Appetite Becomes Keener and Hearty Dishes are in Order.

Chicken Salad.

Mix two cupfuls of diced cold chicken (using all white meat or all dark meat or half of each) with one cupful of celery diagonally sliced, according to the Chinese custom. Marinate with a mild French dressing, drain well and mix with cooked dressing.

Arrange on lettuce leaves and garnish with ripe, green or stuffed olives, curled celery or finely chopped colored aspic jelly.

Cauliflower Scallop.

This is a very hearty dish. Cook the cauliflower in salted water (to which a few teaspoonfuls of milk have been added) until tender, then separate into small pieces. Milk tends to whiten the vegetable. Prepare the sauce from three tablespoonfuls of flour mixed with three tablespoonfuls melted oleo, and add slowly two cupfuls of milk, half a teaspoonful of salt and a quarter of a teaspoonful of paprika. Cook, stirring constantly until well thickened, and blend in two egg yolks, lightly beaten.

Arrange cauliflower and sauce in alternate layers in a baking dish and cover the top with crushed dried bread crumbs mixed with grated cheese. Bake in a hot oven for ten minutes.

Chocolate Cream Pie

Take one-half cupful cocoa, one-half cupful cornstarch, two cupfuls milk, two egg whites, one-half cupful sugar, three egg yolks, one-fourth teaspoonful salt, one tablespoonful vanilla. Mix cocoa, sugar, cornstarch, egg yolks, salt and milk. Cook in double boiler till thick, stirring constantly; flavor with vanilla. Pour into a baked pie crust shell, cover with a meringue made by beating egg whites till stiff and adding two tablespoonfuls sugar; brown in oven and serve cold.

Mock Veal Cutlet.

Soak a cupful of lentils, (peas and beans) over night, drain and boil up twice, pouring off the water and adding fresh boiling water. When boiled tender press through a colander and add one cupful of finely ground peanuts, two tablespoonfuls of melted butter, one cupful of dried bread crumbs and salt and pepper to taste, with just enough milk to make it a mush-like batter. Pour into a flat serving dish and bake for one hour in a moderate oven.

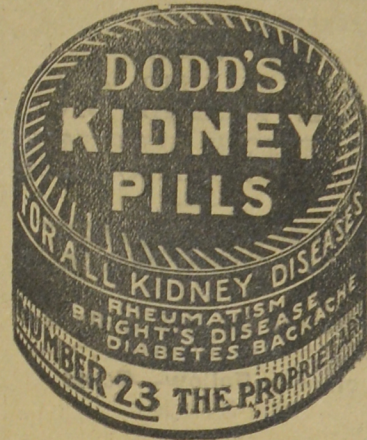
