MANY NAMES MENTIONED FOR LIBERAL LEADERSHIP

Active Preparations for the National Liberal Con-
vention are Being Carried on in All Parts of
the Country — Four Western Provinces Will
Each Name a Man for the Leadership — On-
tario Has Three Candidates to Put Forward.

Ottawa, July 21—All the dominion's
prominent Canadian Liberals are act-
ively at work in preparation for the
national Liberal convention. The doz-
en men whose names have been put
forward for the Liberal leadership are
staying more or less modestly in the
background, but their friends are
strenuously at work.

In British Columbia Premier John
Oliver and members of his govern-
ment, along with Messrs F. T. Cong-
don, K. C., M. A., MacDonald, K.C.,
J. H. Sinclair, K. C. and others are
strenuous in work to make the con-
vention a success so far as British
Columbia is concerned. They will
bring with them their candidate for
leadership in W. W. B. McInnes, who
has been a member in both the feder-
al and the provincial house, was once
a minister of the crown and at another
time governor of the Yukon.

Coming farther east to Alberta one
finds such active workers as Premier
Stewart, Hon. Frank Oliver, Hon. C.
W. Cross, Hon. A. G. MacKay, Hon.
Duncan Marshall, Mr. W. H. White,
M. P. Hon. George P. Smith and oth-
ers with whom who name as a candi-
date for the leadership M. A. Clarke,
K. C., ex-M. P., of Calgary.

Martin Making Strong Bid

In Saskatchewan prominent among
influential workers are men like Hon.
C. A. Dunning, Hon. W. R. Motherwell,
Hon. Geo. Langley and Mr. G. C. M.
Hamilton.

They will all line up behind their
premier, Hon. W. M. Martin whose
chances for the leadership are regard-
ed as brighter than those of any other
western man.

Manitoba has strong men at work
from Premier Norris and Hon. Dr.
Thornton down. Mr. Alexander Mac-
Leod, if Morden, is prominent in the
organization and preparatory work
being done in that province. Hon. A.
B. Hudson, ex-attorney general of
Manitoba, will receive the backing of
a strong Manitoba delegation for lead-
ership. Ontario has three candidates
for the leadership, Hon. Geo. P. Gra-
ham, Hon. W. M. King and Mr. F. F.
Pardee, M. P., but will divide her al-
legiance even on the first vote among
other aspirants as well, both east and
west. Among the noteworthy workers
in Ontario in the interest of the con-
vention are Sir Allan Aylesworth, of
Toronto, Hon. Charles Murphy and Al-
exander Smith, of Ottawa, H. C. Ken-
nedy, M.P., Duncan Ross, M. P., Hart-
ley H. Dewar, leader of the opposition
the presidents of six Liberal district
associations, Geo. S. Gibbons, London
W. E. N. Sinclair, Oshawa; H. D.
Ramsden, Mount Albert, Ontario; H.
H. Horsey, Cressy, Ontario; W. G. A.
McGanghey, North Bay, and Wm. G.
P. Mooney, Port Arthur.

In Quebec there are wheels within
wheels, but the two chief figures in
the first vote for the leadership of
Quebec members will be premier
Gouin and Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux. If
it was not already accepted by both
French speaking and English speak-
ing Liberals that it is now the turn of
an English speaking man for leader,
there is no doubt that Sir Lomer
Gouin would be one or if not the chief
figure at the convention. The hard
workers for the convention will be
Hon. Jacques Bureau, Hon. Ernest
Lapointe, Hon. W. Mitchell, Mr. L. A.
Letourneau and Mr. Severin Letour-
neau and others. The name of Hon. Sid-

ney Fisher also appears among those
listed for the leadership.

The Maritime Workers

Strong influences are being exerted
in New Brunswick by Premier W. E.
Foster, O. Turgeon and Mr. A. B. Copp
M.P.

In Nova Scotia Premier Murray,
Hon. R. McGregor, Hon. A. T. Daniels
and J. L. Ralston, K. C., M. P. P. of
the 85th battalion, are throwing their
powerful influence with the conven-
tion workers. Two Nova Scotia can-
didates for the leadership are Mr. D.
D. MacKenzie, leader for the opposition
in the dominion house now and Hon.
W. S. Fielding, the last named but a
veteran who may yet prove the choice
of the convention.

In Prince Edward Island they are
having trouble enough of their own
with a provincial election in which the
opposition has an excellent chance of
winning, representatives will be here
however. There will be a number of
withdrawals from the contest even be-
fore the first vote at the convention.

morning for Bangor.


Junior Chautauqua
