

LIQUOR WAS STOLEN WHILE BEING SHIPPED

WAS CONSIGNED TO
VENDOR NEAR CITY

Theft Reported to Police, Who
are Working on Case—No
Information from the
Authorities.

A theft of a considerable quantity of liquor consigned to a vendor near Fredericton is reported to have occurred one night recently. The liquor was consigned by a wholesale house in St. John and was being sent by express. The express company which had charge of the shipment is responsible. There appears to be considerable doubt as to where the liquor left the charge of the company, whether at the C. P. R. station or at the office in this city.

Reported to Police

The loss was reported to the police but Chief Finley has no information to give on the matter. The case is being investigated.

This is not the first theft of liquor while in transit and under the charge of an express company. Some thirsty persons evidently make a practise of watching such shipments and taking advantage of opportunity.

PROPORTION OF WOMEN WHO REGISTER SMALL

TWO HUNDRED AND FIFTY
INCLUDING CHURCH LIST

Revisors Still Ready to Receive
Names—Agitation for Reg-
istration in Devon—
Steps Taken.

The number of women who reside in Fredericton who have registered at City Hall is still very small in comparison with the total number of women, twenty-one years and over who have the right to vote in provincial elections.

Up till noon today about two hundred and fifty names had been handed in to the revisors who are at work on the lists. Included among these are some seventy-five names that were handed in by Mr. R. H. Boone, J. P., who registered that number at the George Street Baptist Church last evening. It is clearly shown by this that the women in this city are not taking a very active part in the registration as only between eleven and fourteen percent of those eligible to vote have registered. Mr. A. J. Wheeler, Ald. William McKay, and Ald. T. S. Wilkinson of the Board of Revisors are having an easy time.

Devon Not Much Interested

At Devon Chairman Harold B. Colwell, and Ald. H. H. Pickard and Roy Flower are engaged in preparing the voters lists. Mr. H. B. Colwell chairman of the Board and other members were asked what was being done and said that arrangements would be made to register women. It is understood that they are being besieged with telephone calls. This would indicate that the Devon women are anxious to get their votes. October 5th is the last day that registration will take place. After the lists are published there will be an opportunity of appeal.

NEW SERVICE INAUGURATED ON THE C. N. R.

EVENT ONE OF GREAT
IMPORTANCE TO CITY

Large Patronage on Initial Run
From St. John—Lieut.
Governor and Premier
Coming.

The inauguration of the C. N. R. service between St. John and Centreville and the sleeping car service between St. John and Quebec via Fredericton and McGivney will take place today. The event is one of great importance to Fredericton and also to the Lower St. John Valley which now is getting its first regular train-service.

Conductors and Drivers

The train from St. John due here this evening will be under the charge of Conductor Henry with Driver Laughlin at the throttle. On the train from Centreville, Conductor Sterling is in charge and Driver Cowperthwaite is in the cab.

Large Patronage Expected

Reports from St. John are to the effect that a large patronage was expected on the initial run. Many residents of the lower part of the river went to St. John by steamer to come up today by rail. The first ticket issued in St. John for the new C.N.R. branch was a return ticket to Temple, York County.

Fairly Heavy Train

The train from St. John today is expected to be fairly heavy including a buffet-sleeping car as well as first-class and second class coaches and baggage car. The sleeper will be detached here and attached to the New-castle express as far as McGivney.

Governor and Premier

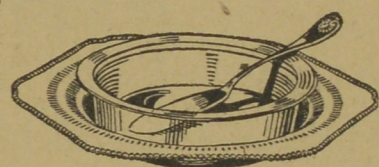
