SITUATION RE RUGBY STILL IS CLOUDED

Provincial League for 1920 is
Proposed — Fredericton,
Moncton and St. John
Suggested.

The intercollegiate Rugby situation in the Maritime Provinces still is shady although several games have been played. Dalhousie defeated the Wanderers in the Halifax City series, and the next week putting on an intercollegiate team against the same club, was beaten decisively. The same Dal team went to Antigonish and made monkeys out of St. F. X. to the tune of 22 to 0. St. Dunstan's playing in a city series at Charlottetown beat the Abegweits 11 to 0 and repeated in Charlottetown with Mount A, the harrowing details being 9 to 0. What is the answer? Unless a miracle happens King's will be trimmed by Dal in Halifax so the Yellow and Black looks sure for the Eastern Intercollegiate title. What college is going to qualify for a playoff with Dal? The score at Sackville next Wednesday when Acadia will meet Mt. Allison will go far toward clearing the situation.

Knowledge of the rules of English Rugby or even ordinary details are lacking on the part of many newspaper writers in the Maritime Provinces. Why is hard to say, as no other brand of football but a little "soccer" has been played in these parts for more than thirty years. Yet it is curious to observe some writer in the Moncton Transcript repeatedly referring to a Rugby team as being composed of eleven players. He evidently has been brought up on the American game. At that however the Transcript is trying to rouse interest in the Railway City both on the part of the High School and the city athletes, and deserves credit.

Mt. Allison Academy at Sackville is desirous of playing St. John High at Sackville.

St. John and Moncton players are pointing out the desirability of a New Rugby League for 1920 with Fredericton, St. John and Moncton in the circuit. With a prospect of a regular series of games one each Saturday, this city should be able to enter a team.

The University of New Brunswick has asked St. Dunstan's University of Charlottetown to play here if that team is to play in Sackville against Mt. Allison in a return game.
