

BEST PACKED APPLES SOLD AT MONTREAL

NEW BRUNSWICK HAS MADE GREAT ADVANCE

Only Third Year of Development of Market—N. B. Fruit Outsold Others This Season.

New Brunswick apples arrived on the Montreal market in better condition than those from Ontario, Quebec or Nova Scotia, according to the information received by A. G. Turney, Provincial Horticulturalist, who has just returned from Montreal. Mr. Turney's visit to Montreal was for the purpose of learning in what condition the New Brunswick fruit was arriving and general market conditions. He was very pleased to find the fruit packed and shipped by members of the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association arriving in perfect condition. Unfortunately a few lots shipped by growers who were not members of the Association, reached Montreal in poor condition. This was due to faulty packing. It is essential that all apples sent to that market be graded properly and well packed.

Outselling Others

Recently there was a drop in the price of apples at Montreal due to heavy arrivals of low grade Gravensteins from Nova Scotia. Those apples are about finished, however. All season fruit from this province has been outselling that from other districts.

Fameuse and McIntosh Red are the varieties now in demand at Montreal. Fameuse have been sold there as high as nine dollars per barrel. Russets and Bethels will be shipped there shortly.

Only Third Year

This is only the third year that the Montreal market has been developed by New Brunswick fruit-growers and recognition by the trade of apples from this province as the best on the market is most gratifying. The market is capable of indefinite expansion if the high standard is kept up.

CAPTURED HUN FIELD GUN FOR BEST DISTRICT

PRIZE OFFERED IN THE VICTORY LOAN CAMPAIGN

This relieves the local institution of the financial burden in connection with supplying a General Secretary for at least this winter.

Preparations

Mr. A. S. McAllister, Maritime organizing secretary was present and explained the various steps necessary to get the actual work under way and promised his co-operation in securing a trained physical instructor.

On motion it was decided that the yearly membership fees should be as follows: Boys 12 to 16—\$2.00; Young Men—\$5.00; Business Men—\$10.00.

The House Committee will immediately make plans for the renovation of the building, supplying of equipment, etc., in order that effective work may be begun at once.
