





Amateur Outfits Regulated.

With the increase in the number of amateur stations. Chief Krumm pointed out, the Government has made provisions regulating the wave length power of the stations. As a rule no more than a kilowater wave length is permitted, and in case an amateur station is situated in the vicinity of a Government transmitting station only a half kilowater wave length is per-

The amateur operators receive interesting messages on their miniature appartus, some of these coming from governmental, but most of them from commercial, sources. In order that these messages may not receive too much publicity, stringent penalties are provided for the amateurs who divulge what they hear.
