BOMBS WERE
HURLED AT
LORD FRENCH

Dublin, Dec. 22.—The State's Attorney gave details of the attempt to assassinate Viscount French, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, when the inquest over the body of Savage, the young grocer's clerk, who was shot and killed while running from the scene of the attempt, was resumed here today.

The first car carrying Viscount French passed quickly by the spot from which the shots were fired, the testimony developed, two bombs being hurled in quick succession. Both of them struck a second car, which was empty, the second bomb exploding inside the vehicle. The military escort killed Savage while the latter was in the act of throwing a bomb.

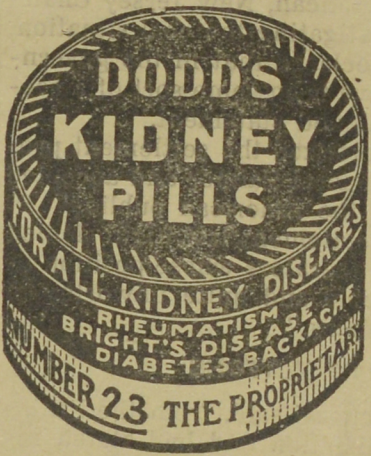

MANY NEW YORK WOMEN
TAKE UP STUDY OF RADIO

Back Alley Urchins, Kings of Finance and Fifth Avenue Debutantes, Too, Are Victims of the Fascinating Craze for Wireless Telegraphy, and "Listen In" Whenever Opportunity Offers—Chief Inspector Talks.

Back alley urchins, frock coated and dignified kings of finance, department store salesladies, stenographers and Fifth Avenue debutantes—all have fallen victim to the latest craze, "listen in," on the rhythmic ticks of the wireless apparatus.

L. R. Krumm, chief radio inspector, who has charge of the wireless service and inspection in this naval district, says that women prominent in society have adopted the newest fad. Day after day the chief receives applications from them for amateur radio licenses.

"And curiously enough," the chief said, as he sat in his office on the sixth floor of the Custom House, "women in all walks of life have gone in strong for that kind of pastime since the war time restrictions on wireless were lifted."

"I could mention the names of men and women who have come to me for information and licenses—men who are at the head of large corporations, presidents of banking houses, brokers holding seats, in the stock exchange, heads of railroads and wives of men worth millions."

Now an Old Boy's Game.

"Wireless telegraphy is now an old boy's game. If you fly in an airplane over the roofs of the Riverside Drive palaces, you will see here and there miniature wireless towers with wires extending to the apartments below."

"Before the war there was at least 800 amateur transmitting and 3,000 receiving stations in the metropolitan district. Since the war restrictions have been lifted the number has increased to 2,000 transmitting and 8,000 receiving stations."

"I have been receiving on the average forty applications for amateur licenses daily. The applicants are anywhere from 12 to 60 years old. The number is increasing daily."

Thirty Women Get Licenses.

"There are now thirty licensed women wireless operators in this city. They have formed an organization of their own. Some of them are engaged in other occupations and have taken up wireless telegraphy as a hobby."

As a rule the older men who come to Chief Krumm for a license are a bit shy about confessing their weakness for the hobby. In many instances they pretend that they are simply providing a little fun and a profitable pastime for their little sons.

"The other day the president of a wire concern came to me for an amateur license," said Mr. Krumm. "He wanted to set up an outfit at his Riverside Drive home that would cost at least \$5,000. At first he was trying to tell me that he was doing it for his little boy."

"We got to talking about things in general and at last the manufacturer, who is 56 years old, came out with the reason why he spends his leisure moments listening to the wireless ticks."

"In the old days, he told me, he started life as a telegraph operator at \$30 a week. Now he is worth a couple of thousand times that amount. One of his closest friends is a Wall street broker. In the days gone by the two men worked side by side as telegraph operators."

Amateur Outfits Regulated.

With the increase in the number of amateur stations, Chief Krumm pointed out, the Government has made provisions regulating the wave length power of the stations. As a rule no more than a kilowatt wave length is permitted, and in case an amateur station is situated in the vicinity of a Government transmitting station only a half kilowatt wave length is permitted.

The amateur operators receive interesting messages on their miniature apparatus, some of these coming from governmental, but most of them from commercial sources. In order that these messages may not receive too much publicity, stringent penalties are provided for the amateurs who divulge what they hear.

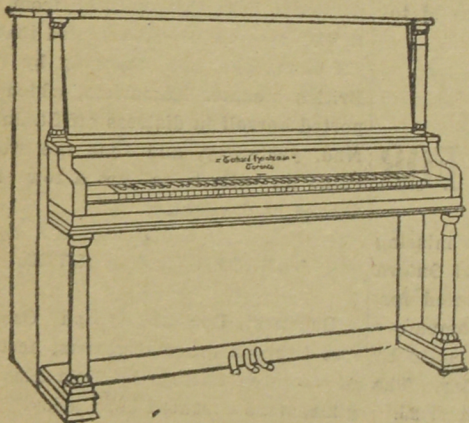
