

THE JUST RIGHT KITCHEN

The Furnishings, Like Friends and Books, Should be Few and Well Chosen—The High Stool.

Kitchen furnishings are either just wrong or just right. The requirements of a family kitchen can be mathematically computed, with the answer in black and white, so that there is no getting away from the result.

All sorts of elasticity are allowable in the furnishing of the other rooms in the house, but in the case of the kitchen, it is a business proposition. So, why not do whatever bit of addition or subtraction will solve the problem and have nothing less than just right kitchen furnishings.

Choose Wisely.

Like friends and books, these certainly should be few and well chosen. If your kitchen is too big, don't add more merely to help fill it up. Choose only the articles really needed for comfort and convenience, and so save confusion and unnecessary work.

A kitchen cabinet, if it be a well-arranged one, solves the greater part of the problem. Another table will probably be found useful, besides the one which is part of the cabinet. Then, the high stool or chair should not be overlooked, since with it one can sit down while performing a great many kitchen tasks, for which purpose the ordinary chair would be too low.

Usually, one chair besides the stool is quite enough—or perhaps a kitchen bench in its place.

As to the floors, there are other things besides linoleum and oilcloth. The mineral and tiled floors are better, as they look twice as attractive and have no "wear out" in them.

A painted floor, say in bright blue or green to match woodwork or furniture is cheap, good looking and practical. Oil cloth rugs, woven to look like rag rugs, of strips of oilcloth, are scrubbable and will be a welcome suggestion to many.

PAPER CHRYSANTHEMUMS

Ragged chrysanthemums may be made of white, pink, red or yellow paper. The circles are cut from one to five inches in diameter, crinkled from the centre, and then strung on a wire on the end of which a wad of paper has been secured.

They are then passed through the hand as if they were a piece of paper to be crinkled, a calyx pasted on, leaves are cut from the same, and the stem is covered and fastened to a natural twig.

RACE RIOT IN ARKANSAS

Little Rock, Ark., Oct. 2.—A special train is being made up here to take 500 troops from Cap Pike to Elaine, Ark., where a race riot is said to be in progress. Three white men were shot from ambush near Elaine last night. According to reports from Helena, fighting between bands of whites and negroes began this morning. A posse from Helena participated in one fight and three or more wounded men, members of the posse, were brought to Helena this afternoon. A report from Elaine late today said two white men were killed and another wounded, and five negroes were killed. The situation was growing more critical the message stated.

HAVING BOYS HOME IS WORTH THE EXPENSE

No debt should be more cheerfully met by a grateful nation than that incurred in bringing her victorious soldiers back from war and re-establishing them in civil life.

Just as soon as the Armistice was signed there was joyful and impatient anticipation in every home that had a soldier abroad. Everyone desired the return of their own particular hero without delay. So did all Canada, while the warworn soldiers themselves were eager to be back to the land of the Maple.

What appeared to be unsurmountable difficulties in a stupendous undertaking were overcome. Colossal expenditure was entailed in the solution of one of the most difficult problems associated with the war. The cost of speedy demobilization of the troops has proved enormous and now, to finish paying for this, it is incumbent upon every citizen to subscribe to the greatest extent in his or her power to the Victory Loan of 1919.

This loan will look after the money side of many of the pressing problems facing Canada today in connection with the obligations owing to her soldiers, including the payment of all the men who are not yet demobilized, and the statutory gratuity to assist discharged soldiers in their re-adjustment to civil life.

It is a big proposition but the people of Canada are big too and must make the Victory Loan their crowning achievement since peace was declared.

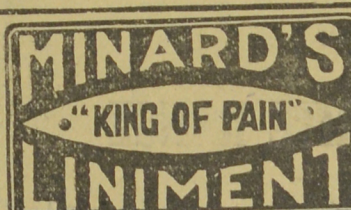

TRAIN SERVICE VALLEY RAILWAY

Commencing Wednesday, October 1st, the C. N. R. will begin the operation of the Valley Railroad. On Wednesday the service will open with a passenger train leaving St. John at 1.55 p.m. and arriving at Fredericton at 5.30 p.m. This train will leave at 6 p.m. for Centreville and Woodstock. The regular service will be by passenger trains leaving St. John at 1.55 p.m. Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, arriving at Fredericton at 5.30 p.m., and leaving for Centreville at 6 p.m. on the same days.

Passenger trains will leave Centreville at 7 a.m. for St. John, arriving at Fredericton at 11 a.m., and leaving at 11.30 a.m. for St. John.

On Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays service will be by mixed train leaving St. John at 6 a.m., arriving in Fredericton at 11 a.m., leaving at 2 p.m. for Woodstock and Centreville. The south-bound train will leave Centreville at 6.15 a.m., arriving at Fredericton at 11.40 a.m., and leave at 3 p.m. for St. John.

On Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday a through sleeper for Quebec will run from St. John to Fredericton and be attached to No. 28 Express leaving at 6.25 p.m., stop at McGivney, where it will be attached to No. 501 train on the Transcontinental and proceed to Quebec via Edmundston, Monk and the Bridge, arriving at 11 a.m. the next day.

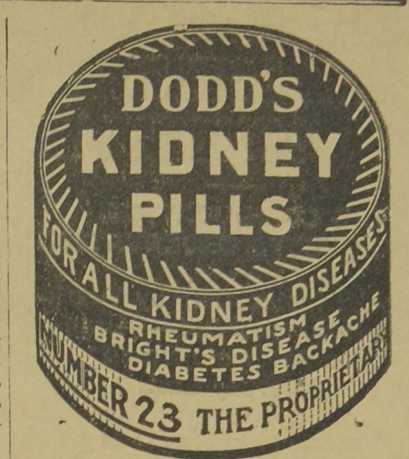

Town Marshal Leo Hayes of Devon yesterday rounded up a lad playing truant who proved to be an old offender. He appeared before Police Magis-



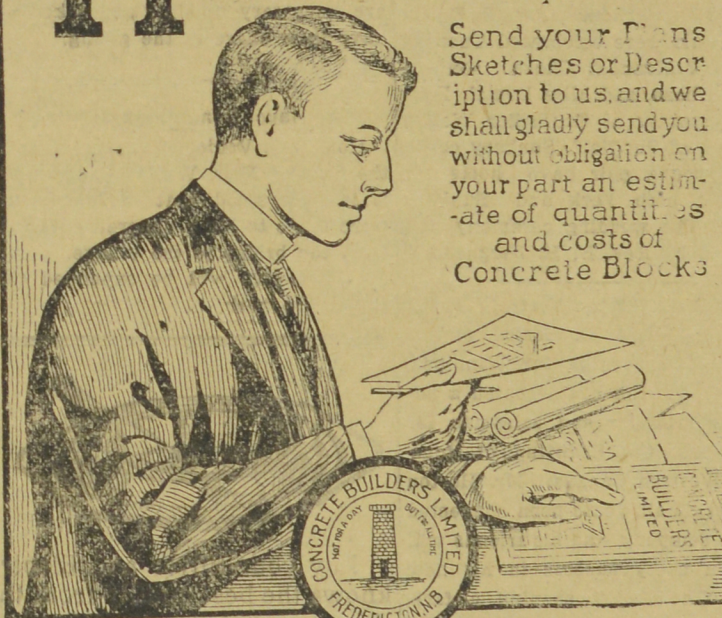
LOST IN BUSH FOR TEN DAYS
