DROP TO PRE-WAR LEVEL

Owing to the Mild Weather, There was Little Demand for
Frozen Fish Last Winter—Dealers Tave a Big Stock on
Hand, Which is Being Offered at Reduced Prices—The
Outlook Good for the Coming Season.

Montreal, May 20.—Although the delicate of all, brought 10c. to 12c. as
housewife may have overlooked it in well.

The lobster season is at the peak
and all this week lovers of this ex-
travagant luxury should be able to in-
dulge in the favorite dish by expend-
ing the modest sum of 20c. a pound.
A weak of heavy supply occurs every
year, he said, but people usually do
not realize it until it is over. Shrimps,
too, are at their best this week and
are selling at 35c. to 40c. a pound—
and there is a great deal of concen-
trated nourishment too in a pound of
shrimps," Mr. Paulhaus added. China-
men are the best customers for these
shellfish and are ordering them in
large quantities.

In fact shrimps are also imported
from the United States and a good por-
tion of the price charged for them
was due to the duty of 32½ per cent.
for coming into Canada.

From a National Standpoint.

"It is a puzzling thing," said a dealer
"that although everyone is ready to
complain bitterly of the high price of
foodstuffs they are not sufficiently
willing to take advantage of a good
cheap nourishing food that is to be
had in large quantities for the asking.
From a national point of view we
should make every effort to export
such commodities as butter, eggs and
pork products when they are needed
by other countries, and support our-
selves on the products for which we
have no market. No one seems to
have faced the situation squarely for
I hear nothing but complaints on ev-
ery side because we are exporting our
foodstuffs and getting such excellent
prices. The consumption of fish has
increased somewhat, but by no means
in proportion to the difference in price
between it and other foods and the
efforts we have made to educate the
public to its value."

There must be millions of pounds
of frozen fish in the storage house of
the United States and Canada today
waiting for purchasers," J. A. Paul-
haus, proprietor of the D. Hatton Co.,
told a reporter this morning.

"Fishermen are going to experience
considerable difficulty in marketing
their catch this summer," the mer-
chant continued. "The wholesalers
will require only a limited amount of
fish and on the other hand indications
are that production in Atlantic waters
will be heavier than usual.

"East winds have prevailed during
the spring, and this phenomenon in-
variably means large schools of mi-
gratory fish, such as herring, mack-
arel, salmon and smelts. The bank
fish, such as cod, halibut and haddock
will likely be normal, nevertheless we
are looking for a supply of all varie-
ties which will be large enough to
bring prices down to rock bottom
levels."

Low Prices Prevail.

Mr. Paulhaus quoted fish prices that
could—or at any rate should—be ob-
tained in the retail stores today, and
the contrast between haddock at 8c.
and 10c. a pound and beef at anything
up to 50c. was more than striking. And
fresh cod should be sold retail at 8c.
to 10c., fresh herring at 8c., halibut
fresh or frozen at 25c. to 26c., a re-
duction of 5c. Frozen salmon is very
plentiful and should be had for 20c. a
pound. River fish were coming in
fresh and delicious. Such varieties as
carn and perch should be selling at
10c. to 12c., while flounder, the most

PRINCE OF WALES
TO VISIT CANADA

Ottawa, May 20.—The Prince of
Wales will visit Canada in August of
this year, and will open the new Par-
liament buildings at Ottawa.

Sir Thos. White stated in the House
this afternoon, just before the Com-
mons rose for dinner, that he had re-
ceived a message from His Majesty
the King through the Governor, Gen-
eral as follows:

"I am very glad to tell you that with
my entire approval the Prince of
Wales will visit Canada this year in
August. He will open the new Parlia-
ment buildings in Ottawa."

It is understood that the Prince of
Wales will also open the Canadian
National Exhibition at Toronto the
same month.

GOVERNMENT
HAS RESIGNED

St. Johns, Nfld., May 20.—Premier
Lloyd tendered the resignation of the
ministry to the Governor of Newfound-
land tonight. The cabinet crisis came
to a head after the resignation of
Finance Minister Cashin earlier in the
day.

When Premier Lloyd was given to
understand that Minister Cashin was
supported in his attitude by the ma-
jority of the government party in the
assembly, he decided to offer the re-
signation of the entire ministry.

The Lloyd government was formed
two years ago as a war cabinet.
