Name of a Sackville Company Changed and Capital Stock Greatly Enlarged—Official Notice Given.

Another real estate company which will operate in St. John City is incorporated according to the notice published in today's Royal Gazette. The new company is The King Street Building Co., Limited and is capitalized at \$49,000. The head office is to be St. John City. The powers of a general real estate company are conferred including the right to buy, build, acquire, sell, etc. Those incorporated are Geo. Wilbert Currie of St. John, James Michéau Scovil of St. Stephen and J. F. H. Teed of St. John.

Sackville Company Expands
The Royal Gazette also contains notice of the extension of the business of a Sackville company. The name of W. H. Oulton & Company, Limited being changed to The Sackville Hardware Company, Limited and the capital stock being increased from \$5,000 to \$49,000.

The death occurred at the Victoria Hospital this morning of Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes wife of Gilbert Holmes of this city. The deceased was 40 years of age and is survived by her husband, her mother, Mrs. William McCain, by three sisters, Mrs. A. Clayborne and Miss Freda McCain of this city, and Miss Gladys McCain of Montreal. The funeral will take place Thursday afternoon with service at the late home, Northumberland Street at three o'clock by Rev. G. M. Young. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery.

Remanded Until Tomorrow
Two youths aged fourteen and seventeen came before Magistrate Limerick this morning charged with theft and assault and were remanded to jail until tomorrow for judgement. The youths who are from Marysville were out on a fishing-trip when they discovered the milk and cookies provided by two teachers as a lunch for their pupils who were out on an Arbor Day excursion. The youths made away with the lunch and then having caught some fish they took one and rubbed it over one of the younger girl's faces.

Offer From Sackville
Mr. F. W. Harrison of this city has been offered the directorship of the Organ Department of the Mt. Allison Conservatory of Music, Sackville, N. B. He now has the offer under consideration. Mr. Harrison has been organist and choirmaster of the Fredericton Methodist Church for about fifteen years and for a number of years has been director of musical instruction in the public schools of Fredericton. The music loving public of this city will greatly regret Mr. Harrison's departure from Fredericton should he decide to accept the offer.

Made Presentation Last Evening
The choir of Christchurch Parish Church and a large number of friends gathered at the home of Mr. Joseph Oldham, Woodstock Road, last evening and presented him with a tie-pin on behalf of the choir-members, Mr. Oldham being the organist of that church. Mr. Oldham is leaving this evening for New York where he will continue his musical studies. He has been for some time organist at the Parish Church and has been very popular. While his many friends will miss him they wish him every success in the furtherance of his studies. The evening was very pleasantly passed and refreshments were served at the close.

Discharged Yesterday
The men of the mobile company of the 7th C. G. R. were demobilized yesterday at St. John. There were more than 250 men to receive their discharge. It undoubtedly comes as a relief to the men in this unit. There had been considerable dissatisfaction among the men since the signing of the armistice owing to the fact that they were still held for duty. The matter has been the cause of discussion in parliament. Military officials at Ottawa have finally decided to demobilize all mobile companies in the garrison regiments throughout Canada and in conformity with this policy activities were commenced yesterday.

ROBERT CHILDS' BODY FOUND IN THE WOODS

DEMENTED MURDERER COMMITTED SUICIDE

Held Weapon Close to Body, and His Clothing was Ignited, Burning His Flesh.

Dr. T. C. Allen, Deputy Attorney General of New Brunswick, was informed by telephone message from Buctouche shortly before noon today that the body of Robert Childs who shot three people near Rexton May 15th, the shooting resulting in the death of his sister-in-law Mrs. John Childs, had been found in the woods not far from the scene of the tragedy.

A wound on the body indicated that Childs had taken his own life with one of the revolvers with which he was armed and evidently he held the weapon so close to his body that the flame of the discharge set fire to his clothing burning his body very much.

The message was from either Mr. A. A. Dysart, M. P. for Kent or from the sheriff of the county Dr. Allen was unable to say which.

Anxiety Relieved
The finding of the body relieves the people of Kent County of great anxiety as the presence of the demented murderer at large in the woods caused many of the inhabitants to be stricken with terror. The crime of Childs although it will not be followed by a murder trial has resulted in great expense as huge posies were out scouring the country for him.

Circumstances of Case
Robert Childs, alias Robert McIntosh, recently of Moncton and formerly of Vancouver, B. C. shot his nephew's wife Mrs. John Childs, her son, Harold Childs, and a neighbor Louis Hebert and also set fire to a barn burning six head of cattle and a horse on the morning of May 15th at Rexton Kent County. Mrs. John Childs died from the results of the shooting and Louis Hebert who was shot twice through the breast is in a critical state. Harold Childs the son of Mrs. Childs was shot through the groin. The murderer claimed a portion of the property and for some time had showed signs of mental derangement.

RETURNED SOLDIERS APPOINTED

TWO MORE JOIN THE N. B. FOREST SURVEY

They are J. Miles Gibson, of Fredericton, and G. H. Kuhring of St. John—Go to Renous.

Chief Forester G. H. Prince this morning announced that two more returned soldiers have been appointed to the New Brunswick Forest Service. J. Miles Gibson, B. Sc. F., son of Mrs. Ida Gibson of Fredericton has been appointed to the New Brunswick Forest Survey Department. He has displayed marked ability and had considerable experience in forest survey work before going overseas. He was graduated by the University of New Brunswick last week winning the special prize donated by the I. O. D. E. for the highest marks among returned soldiers in the senior class. He was wounded while carrying a comrade out of action.

G. H. Kuhring B. Sc. F. son of Rev. and Mrs. G. A. Kuhring of St. John has been appointed to the New Brunswick Forest Survey Department. He also is a U. N. B. graduate and was the winner of the Sir Frederic Williams Taylor Medal for all-round proficiency in athletics. He enlisted in the field artillery in 1914 and had long service overseas. He was three times wounded and was commissioned a lieutenant while on service.

Both appointees will leave for the head waters of the Renous River Thursday to take up their work.
