DESSERTS EASILY PREPARED.

Fruit Puffs.

Mix well one pint flour, two level tea spoons baking powder and a little salt. Add one cup milk. Put one tablespoon of the dough into well greased cups, then one tablespoon preserved fruit—peach, pears, pineapple, blackberries, raspberries, logan berries, etc. Cover with another spoonful of dough. Steam for 20 minutes. Serve with fruit sauce.

Sauce—Cream two tablespoons of butter add gradually one cup powdered sugar and a little lemon juice. Beat in as much crushed fruit as the mixture will hold. Serve cold or melt over hot water and serve hot.

Lemon Rice Pudding.

1 cup rice, 1 cup milk, 6 tablespoonfuls sugar, 1 egg, half a lemon, quarter tablespoon salt.

Cook rice until nearly done, add the milk, sugar and salt. Cook until rice is very soft. Add grated rind of lemon, beat well. Mix in beaten egg yolk. Put in baking dish, cover with beaten egg white. Bake until slightly browned. May be served either hot or cold.

Coconut Coffee Jelly.

Half box gelatine or two tablespoons granulated gelatine, two cups strong coffee, half cup cold water, half cup coconut, half cup sugar.

Soak gelatine twenty minutes in cold water, dissolve in boiling water, strain and add to sugar, coffee and coconut. Turn into mold and chill. Serve with sugar and cream.

HOUSEHOLD THRIFT.

Any bit of fruit left over from a meal is delicious mashed or put through a sieve the next day for a fruit whip. Appricots, peaches and strawberries all combine as nicely as stewed prunes with the well beaten whites of eggs, into a dainty, nourishing dessert. Of course, sugar is added in a quantity to make sufficiently sweet and the yolks of the eggs may be made into soft boiled custard for a sauce to serve over the whip. A little lemon flavoring added especially brings out a fine fruit flavor.

A simple effective way of labelling canned fruit is to write the kind of fruit the jar contains upon a paper bag the right size to slip over the glass jar. This also helps preserve the fruit for a long time by shutting out light.

SUGGESTIONS.

Turn a silk glove wrong side out before washing.

A few drops of camphor on the tooth brush is refreshing, and it will harden the gums.

Insist on every member of the family at least planning for eight hours' sleep nightly.

When the feet burn bath them daily with water in which there is a little bicarbonate of soda.

A wart may be removed without soreness by application of oil of cinnamon three times a day.

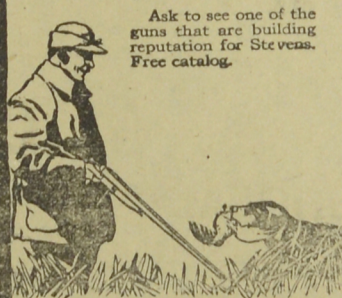
