When 16 of these have been purchased they may be exchanged for a War Savings Stamp. With the first Thrift Stamp purchased goes a Thrift Card, to which the Stamps should be fixed as soon as received.

After the 16 Thrift Stamps have been exchanged for a War Savings Stamp, the person doing so should start in again to buy Thrift Stamps, and thus begin saving for the second War Savings Stamp.
