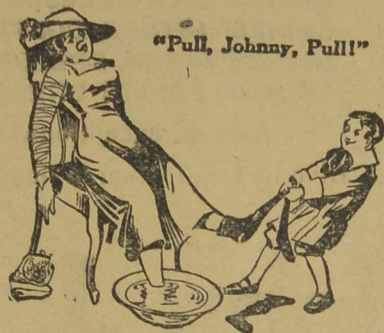

it.LABOR TROUBLES PARTLY
RESPONSIBLE FOR H. C. OF L.

Ottawa Ont., June 13.—That labor troubles at the present
time partially are responsible for the high cost of living in Can-
ada was indicated this morning at the meeting of commons
committee dealing with that matter.

H. H. Stevens, read two telegrams to the committee show-
ing that there is half a million pounds of meat lying unloaded
in the harbor at Vancouver, and which cannot be unloaded be-
cause the longshoremen are on strike.

Mr. Nicholson, the Chairman of the Committee, doubted if
the committee could do anything to secure the release of the
cargo. The situation, he said, was due to a sympathetic strike.
It was decided after some discussion to forward the telegrams
to the minister of labor.

Thomas Barton, retail butcher, of Toronto, said a butcher
could not get from the farmers what he wanted. Farmers could
not sell to the trade, Swift's of Chicago, controlled the union
stock yards. Farmers had to hand their cattle over to the com-
mission men.

Chairman Nicholson pointed out that the effect of Mr. Bar-
ton's evidence was that the combine existed in Toronto to pre-
vent the small butcher getting meat in order to do business.
The matter therefore should be inquired into further.

Mr. Barton said that if he were able to go on the market,
buy his cattle and slaughter it thereby securing the offal he
could sell cheaper meat.

Stewart Harris, a Toronto retail butcher, who has gone in
to the cash and carry business, said that prior to his doing so it
cost him from 14 per cent to 15 per cent to do business, and
now it costs from 6 per cent to 9 per cent, a saving of practi-
cally six per cent. He said he made less money than before the
war, because the public were not buying so much. He did not
have as large a turnover.
