DIVISION ON BUDGET IS EXPECTED NEXT WEEK

Members From West of the Great Lakes are Anxious to Place Themselves on Record—Member for Brandon Says That the Budget is a Step in the Right Direction—Dr. Edwards Makes an Attack on Hon. Mr. Crerar.

Ottawa, June 13—Several more speakers were heard in the budget debate in the commons today but the division on the McMaster amendment is not expected until towards the end of next week. It is expected that nearly every member from west of the great lakes will want to place himself on record before casting a vote.

Today the first western member to do so was D. Whidden, member for Brandon. He said he would support the finance minister's proposals although he would have been better pleased had the concessions made to the west been greater. However the budget was a move in the right direction, he said and the west could not expect all the tariff changes to be made in one year.

Dr. Edwards after 8 o'clock turned his attack upon Hon. T. A. Crerar, declared as minister of agriculture for the last eighteen months, he was chiefly responsible for the high cost of living, that is if there was any responsibility. He, himself claimed that prices of food were high primarily because of the relation between world-wide demand.

However there were companies operating in foodstuffs which had made, he said enormous profits. One of these was the Grain Growers' Company, which owned and operated three hundred elevators and of which Hon. T. A. Crerar was president.

Another was the Saskatchewan Grain Growers' Company of which J. A. McHarg, M. P., was president.

Mr. Reed, of McKenzie rose to correct Dr. Edwards. He said there was no such company in Saskatchewan.

Dr. Edwards retorted if that was not the exact name of the company there was a company of such character doing business in Saskatchewan and of which Mr. McHarg was president.

Dr. Edwards contended that the Union government had done more in the line of tariff reductions for the benefit of farmers than the Liberal party did in fifteen years. He said he would vote against the amendment and for the finance minister's budget proposals.

Mr. d'Angou, Rimouski, said that Canada was faced with bankruptcy because of our unreasonable participation in the war. He opposed the budget because it favored the manufacturers at the expense of the consumers.

W. A. Buchanan, Liberal-Unionist from Lethbridge, in voicing his disapproval of the tariff provisions of the budget maintained that the time was opportune for tariff reductions because such would reduce the cost of living which had been enhanced by the war. Tariff changes were, therefore, a proper remedy to apply during the reconstruction period. He said the cost of living was making people uneasy and dissatisfied.

Edmund Proulx, of Prescott, in supporting the McMaster amendment said he was prepared to go as far as the

member for Red Deer (Dr. Clark) in making tariff changes.

Morning Sittings

Beginning on Tuesday next the house of commons will hold morning sittings, and Saturday sittings will begin on June 21. A motion to this effect was passed by the house today.
