The closing of the Domestic Science and Manual Training Departments at the Fredericton High School building took place yesterday afternoon.

**Manual Training Department**  
At the Manual Training Department some splendid models of desks, tabourettes, clocks, trays and other woodwork models constructed by the male pupils of grades VI, VII and VIII of the public schools of the city were on exhibition. This work has been done under the direction of Mr. B. B. Barnes who has recently accepted the position of Manual Training Instructor at the Provincial Normal School. The cardboard and knitting, printing, etc., was done under the direction of Miss Jennie McFarlane, Sloyd Instructor for the younger pupils and consisted of some splendid specimens of work.

The Domestic Science room presented an array of cakes, bread, cookies, etc., which were offered for sale. Miss Jean Gilliss was assisted in receiving the guests by Mrs. W. G. Clark. The Misses Birs Stanger and Stella O'Connor ushered the guests into the dining room where they were served fruit punch, cake and other delicious articles by the Misses Dorothy Cox, Katharine Allen, Helen Taylor, Myrtle Moffat, Isabel Babbitt and George Pringle.

## QUESTION OF REVALUATION IN ABEYANCE

**GROUND TAKEN THAT  
APPOINTMENT ILLEGAL**

**Meeting of City Council Should  
Have Been Held on Tuesday  
Night—Matter to be  
Reconsidered.**

The matter of a Board of Revaluators for the City of Fredericton which was before the City Council at the regular June session seems to be in abeyance. A board consisting of Dr. W. C. Keirstead, Mr. Herbert V. Gunter and ex-Ald. C. W. Burnett was appointed by vote of the council but notice of reconsideration was immediately given showing that there was opposition to the move. Later a new light was cast on the subject by Chief Assessor A. A. Sterling who informed the Council that it would be ill advised to make a revaluation for purposes of assessment this year on account of inflated values.

### Not Officially Notified

As a matter of fact none of the three valuers has been officially notified by the City Clerk that he has been appointed and it is said that it is unlikely that any will be notified. The ground is taken that the meeting at which the appointments were made was not legally held. That meeting took place on Wednesday night instead of Tuesday as it is claimed it should have been. The postponement was made because Tuesday was June 3rd, the King's Birthday, a public holiday. The City bylaws however contain no provision for postponement of a Council meeting except in the event of a date of meeting falling upon New Year's Day or Christmas.

### Doubt Concerning Willingness

There now is doubt concerning the willingness of some of the gentlemen to act. Dr. Keirstead has not committed himself and it is reported that Mr. Gunter would prefer not to be a member of the Board. Ex-Ald. Burnett at the time of appointment was said to be willing and still is.

There appears to be every likelihood of the question remaining undecided until the next meeting of the City Council.

## LOCAL WOOL AVERAGES HIGHER THAN ONTARIO

**GRADING FOR SELLING  
COOPERATIVELY GOING ON**

**Grading Expert Speaks in High  
Terms of New Brunswick  
Product—Production  
is Increasing.**

The grading of wool for sale by the New Brunswick Co-operative Wool Growers' Association which has been conducted at the Fredericton Exhibition Buildings for some days under the direction of the Livestock Branch of the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture, shows results more satisfactory than ever before. The grading of what wool has been forwarded by growers it is expected will be completed today. Mr. Thompson, the Federal grading expert who has been here for several days, will return again to grade what wool may still come in.

### Superior to Ontario Wool

Mr. Thompson who has had extensive experience in grading wool in Ontario states that the New Brunswick wool which has passed through his hands this season averages higher than that raised in larger provinces. This is accounted for by climatic conditions which tend to produce better fleeces than in more inland districts, and better care of sheep which is taken by the growers.

### Condition of Wool Varies.

The condition of the wool varies according to the care which the grower gives his sheep and the man who forwards good wool receives a price greater than that given his neighbor in direct proportion to the condition of the wool. The farmers who are taking advantage of co-operative selling have been quick to learn that.

### Wool Production Increasing

Wool production in New Brunswick is increasing, greater attention to sheep-raising being given. So far 60,000 pounds has been forwarded for grading and it is estimated that the total will be 100,000 pounds. The quantity is not great compared with what is produced in other provinces but as the quality is high and increased attention is being given to the production of wool the general situation is most encouraging.

### To Take Summer Course

Mr. B. B. Barnes, who has accepted the position of Manual Training Instructor at the Provincial Normal School is leaving the latter part of next week to take a ten weeks' summer course in Manual Training at Peoria, Illinois. He will be accompanied by Mr. Carl Heckbert, a returned soldier who has recently completed a course in Manual Training at the Provincial Normal School.

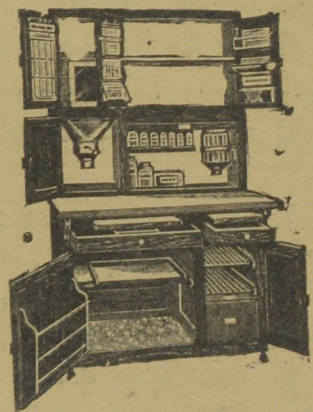
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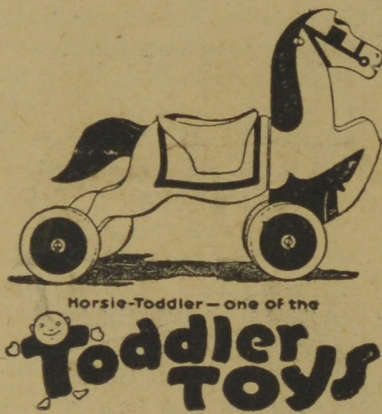
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
