

SIX MONTHS' SENTENCE WITH HARD LABOR

HARD PENALTY UNDER THE PROHIBITION ACT

Charge was a Second Offence of Having Liquor in Possession Not at Place of Residence.

On December 7th of last year Chief of Police Finley accompanied by Police Sergeant Nathaniel Jones had occasion to drop into an uptown beer shop and when they entered the shop one of the men present tried to hide a bottle of liquor but this was perceived and taken by the Chief of Police. The liquor proved to be intoxicating and on December 10th information was laid against the offender on the grounds of having intoxicating liquor in his possession other than his private dwelling place. He was brought before the court and evidence was taken from time to time, the case being held over a period of about two months for various reasons. It was finally adjourned till today when sentence was imposed by Magistrate Limerick. The offense is the second one entered against the defendant so he was sentenced to serve six months in the county jail with hard labor. Mr. P. J. Hughes acted for the prosecution while H. F. McLeod, M. P. was counsel for the defense.

Protection is Required

Left the Rails at Ludlow
On Saturday the C. G. R. freight train from Fredericton ran off the rails at Ludlow. No injury was received by any of the crew and a wrecking crew was run out Sunday morning to clean up. Traffic is now normal.

Sleigh Upset
Some excitement was caused last evening on Charlotte Street when a sleigh turning the corner of Carleton street upset. The occupants were thrown out and the horse started off at a good pace. It was stopped by a party of soldiers after proceeding a short distance.

Twenty-Six Discharges
Twenty-six men were discharged from military service at the District Depot today and are leaving for their homes in the various parts of the province this afternoon and evening. A large number of men are expected towards the last of the week to report at the District Depot.

Popular as Entertainer
Mr. Perry Allen of this city in company with Ald. Judson Barker recently spent some weeks in Boston and vicinity. Mr. Allen who is well known here as an entertainer proved equally successful as such at the Hub. At one entertainment he was encored six times, and at another eighteen.

Increase in Death Rate
The number of deaths in Fredericton between October 31st, 1917 and February 1st, 1918, is recorded as 32 while the number between October 31st, 1918 and February 1st, 1919, is 77 showing an increase of over 100 per cent. Deaths between January 1st, 1919 and February 1st, 1919, numbered 19. No deaths have been reported in this city now for over a week in spite of the previous high death rate.

Husband Critically Ill
Mrs. Thomas Whitehead of Devon has received notice that her husband Private Thomas Whitehead, is critically ill in England with an attack of pneumonia and influenza having been admitted to No. 14 General Hospital, Eastbourne, February 4th. Private Whitehead went overseas with the 55th Battalion in 1916 and was later transferred to the Canadian Engineers. He has been in France for just three years this month.

Death at Rusingornish
Minnie M. Phillips aged twelve years and five months died at her home at Rusingornish Sunday. The deceased was a daughter of Mr. Burden Phillips of that place. Four sisters and three brothers survive. The sisters are Misses Jennie, Thomas, Gladys of Rusingornish. The brothers are John W. Phillips, James T. Phillips and Roland also of Rusingornish. The funeral will take place Tuesday at 2 p. m. with service at the church by Rev. Mr. Carpenter. Interment will be made at Rusingornish.

CARMANIA BROUGHT MANY SOLDIERS

LARGE PARTY CAME TO FREDERICTON

T. Styran Returns After Long Period in German Prison—Frank Bearisto of the 1st Division.

A large number of returned men, numbering about three thousand arrived at Halifax on Saturday aboard the Cunard liner Carmania. Of these two hundred men were from New Brunswick, a considerable number being from this city. Lieut. R. D. S. Neill and Lieut. A. H. VanCorbac were two of the officers in charge of the party and the following Fredericton men were on board: Corp. J. Ward, Pte. Frank Bearisto, Pte. S. Allan, Pte. A. M. Easton, Pte. F. S. Gray, Pte. E. Crouse, Pte. Thomas Styran also Pte. Fred Staples from Devon and Ptes. R. H. Hanson and G. W. Stafford from Marysville.

Lieut. G. H. VanCorbac went overseas with the 104th Battalion. Lieut. R. D. S. Neill went overseas in April 1915 with the 27th Field Battery and was invalided home with typhoid fever. Later he returned overseas going with the tank battalion. He is a son of Mr. James S. Neill of this city.

An Original "First"

Private Frank Bearisto went overseas in October 1914 with the 12th Battalion as a bandsman. After remaining in England some time he joined the 8th Battalion in France. He was wounded three times. He first received a gunshot wound in the leg at the Somme in 1916. At Vimy he was wounded in the back. Lastly he was wounded at Cambrai in 1918 with a gunshot wound in the right shoulder.

Corporal J. Ward of Fredericton, who went across with the 1st Tunnelling Company was also in the party. He served formerly in the R. C. R. at Bermuda. He was wounded in the back at Cambrai.

Was Prisoner in Germany

Private Thomas Styran, son of Mr. George Styran of this city enlisted with the Composite Battalion at Halifax and was later transferred to the Detention Camp at Amherst. From there he was transferred to the 104th Battalion as a Sergeant of signallers and went overseas in July 1916. He relinquished his stripes and went to France with the 49th Battalion. He was captured in a trench raid at Neuville and sent to a prison camp at Dulmen. Later he was transferred to Fredericksville in Rhineland. He was repatriated about the first of November.

GAME ACT IS BEING ENFORCED IN MANY PLACES

LUMBERMEN FINED, CARIBOU MEAT STOLEN

Migratory Birds Act, 1918, not Annulled, but Strengthened—Deer Hides Seized in Madawaska.

Chief Game Warden Gagnon secured two convictions in Restigouche County Friday, a foreman and an employee of a lumber camp on Boland Brook being fined fifty and sixty-five dollars respectively for killing a bull caribou out of season. The offense was committed on December 9th. The guilty parties were afraid of detection by the ranger and hid the meat a mile from camp intending to get it the next day. In the night according to their own statement the meat was stolen by parties unknown.

In Northumberland

Information has been laid for the killing of a deer at Pleasant Ridge some twelve miles from Boiestown. The Chief Game Warden has been notified that the offender is ready to acknowledge the offense.

Deer Hides Seized

At Grand River, Madawaska County five deer hides from animals illegally killed were seized by Ranger Knight and Warden O'Regan.

Act Not Affected

The Chief Game Warden has been notified that the popular impression that a recent decision handed down in the United States Supreme Court made invalid the Migratory Birds Act of 1918, is incorrect. The decision concerned an act passed by the state legislature of Arkansas which has been annulled by the passing of the Migratory Birds Act of 1918 and the latter measure has been strengthened by the decision.

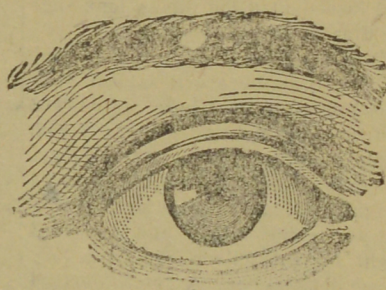

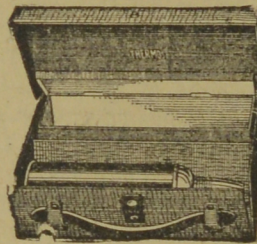
