CLOSURE IS APPLIED IN THE U. S. SENATE

Washington, Nov. 16.—A closure to shut debate out of the peace treaty was adopted today in the Senate.

The vote was 78 to 16. Republican and Democratic leaders voted together for the closure, which means that until the treaty is disposed of no senator may speak in all more than one hour. It was estimated that the step would bring final action within a week.

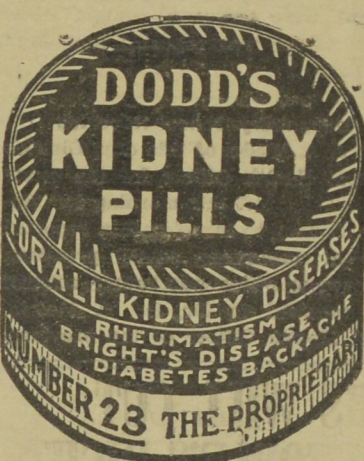
The action, invoking closure for the first time in the Senate's history, resulted in an immediate speeding up of the reservation program, the next reservation on the committee list being adopted within one minute without debate or a roll call. It related to mandates. The text of the reservation adopted follows:

No mandate shall be accompanied by the United States article 22 part one, or any other provision of the treaty of peace with Germany, except by action of the congress of the United States.

WILL INTERPROVINCIAL TRADE IN BOOZE BE RESUMED?

Contention is Made That Order-in-Council Becomes Null One Year After the Signing of the Armistice—Montreal Wholesalers Receive Many Orders from Ontario—Will Have a Three Months' Period to Stock Up.

(Montreal Star)
In spite of the repeated statements in the House of Commons that the Order-in-Council which prohibited inter-provincial shipment of liquor in Canada would not become null and void until the official proclamation of peace, there are some who still hold to the idea that one year after the armistice this order-in-council becomes void. Those who are of this school of thought now consider it perfectly legal to ship liquor into the province of Ontario.

The first day after Armistice Day, yesterday, large quantities of liquor were offered to the express companies in Montreal for shipment to Ontario points. The chief inspector here was called in the matter and asked for a ruling. He replied that "his duties were purely provincial and that inter-provincial shipments was a federal matter. It is expected that a test case will grow out of it, in spite of the fact that the minister of justice has stated on different occasions that not until peace is officially proclaimed will the order-in-council prohibiting inter-provincial shipments become of non-effect.

In any event it is pointed out, the proclamation of peace will take place within the next fortnight, according to all present indications. When it does, what then? What will the new regime be like in the matter of liquor shipments between the province of Quebec and the Province of Ontario?

Conditions Changed
In the old days, before the order-in-council was passed it will be remembered that agents for liquor concerns and others came out of dry Ontario and paddled about in wet Quebec, sending shipments from this province to persons in Ontario in an effort to allay the drought. The question has been asked: Will this old condition be possible again?

Those who are best qualified to analyze the situation likely to develop out of the death of the order-in-council claim that the province of Quebec by reason of the change that has come upon her since the federal order-in-council went through will never again be the same happy hunting ground for Ontario dispensers of wet goods. In the old days, men who carried their offices in the crowns of their hats, came here and started business. They had a sample bottle of liquor. That was their stock in trade. Even at that they did a fairly thriving business with their Ontario connection.

A Chance to Load Up
However between the death of the order-in-council and the birth of the new prohibitory restrictions relative to inter-provincial trade, Ontario will have an opportunity to "licker up". In this period dealers believe that business will be "right brisk" with the adjoining province to the west. Preparations are being made for this muggy period and the activities will no doubt be great.

Inebriation in Ontario means prohibition in Quebec in the minds of many. One closely allied with the enforcement of prohibition in Quebec remarked to The Star yesterday "If we have two million gallons of liquor in Quebec, and Ontario orders a million and a half of that quantity and gets delivery of it—well, its prohibition for Quebec. If Ontario goes on a bat on the proclamation of peace and stays that way for three months and has to

draw her supplies from Quebec, well its going to be easier to enforce prohibition in this province," he continued.

Ontario will have a three month period in the near future in which she may stock up her depleted cellars and settle down to a dry seige with some-think akin to thirsty confidence.

The attitude of the express companies in the matter as explained by C. N. Hamm, secretary of the Express Traffic Association, to The Star this morning, is that not until peace is formally declared are inter-provincial shipments legal.

The express companies yesterday were asked to take shipments for Ontario points but refused because of the fact that they had been advised that inter-provincial shipments were under a ban until peace was declared.

The Express Traffic Association has now in preparation a set of instructions to express agents relating to the new conditions that will come into being with the formal declaration of peace. The laws of different provinces do not concur, therefore, where in some provinces it is legal to ship in a certain manner it is illegal to do the same in another province.

London milliners accept the election of Lady Astor to the House of Commons as a foregone conclusion.

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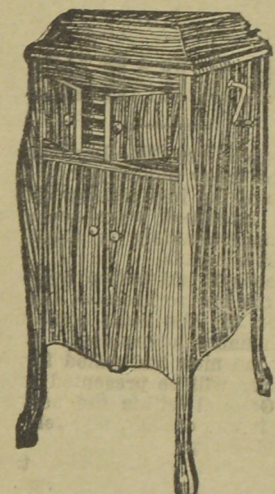
