Today's despatches indicate that Canada's Victory Loan, subscriptions to which closed on Saturday, has been a grand success. The amount called for was \$300,000,000, and this has been the exact sum will not be known until this evening, when it will be announced by the Finance Minister at a public meeting in Toronto. The province of Ontario led the subscriptions with \$272,000,000, Quebec coming next with \$124,000,000. Manitoba comes third with \$31,000,000, and British Columbia fourth with \$28,000,000. "We packed our cigarettes in boxes of four," he said, "be cause the Kavarondos smoke four at a time, putting one in each corner of the mouth and one in each nostrill."

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
